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MINUTES INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

July 20, 1990

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met for the annual organizational meeting at 9:30 a.m. on Friday, July 20, 1990, in the Trustees Meeting Room, 11th Floor, School of Business.

Trustees present: Dr. Anthis, Mr. Breeden, Mr. Green, Mr. O'Neill, Mr. Pemberton, Mr. Smith, Mr. Stelle, Mr. Winchell, and Dr. Zietlow.

President Landini, Vice Presidents Clokey, Dahl, Edgerton and Schafer were present.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Green called the meeting to order at 9:35 a.m.

SECTION I

A. ORGANIZATION OF THE BOARD, 1990-91

Mr. Green announced the annual organizational meeting of the Board of Trustees. He asked the Secretary to call the roll and to read the annual meeting notice. Mr. Smith called upon Mr. Schafer who called the roll as follows:

Mr. Schafer then read the "Notice of the Annual Meeting" of the Board:

"The Indiana State University Board of Trustees will meet for the annual organizational meeting at 9:30 a.m. on Friday, July 20, 1990 in the Trustees Meeting Room, llth Floor, School of Business.

Mr. Green stated that the Nominating Committee had been appointed several months ago. Mr. Winchell has served as chairperson. Mr. Breeden and Mr. Pemberton served on the committee.

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Mr. Winchell read the report of the Nominating Committee as follows:

This Committee nominates this slate of officers for the Board:

Robert D. Green, President Bill C. Anthis, Vice President Donald E. Smith, Secretary Timothy J. O'Neill, Jr., Assistant Secretary Dennis C. Graham, Treasurer

Mr. Green requested that President Landini assume the Chair. President Landini acknowledged the report of the Nominating Committee and briefly reviewed procedures for nominations. Dr. Landini then called for any nominations from the floor. Hearing none, he called for approval of the slate of officers as presented.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mr. Stelle, the recommendation of the Nominating Committee was approved. President Landini declared the officers duly elected and expressed his congratulations.

Mr. Green then resumed the Chair.

B. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

On a motion by Dr. Zietlow, seconded by Mr. Winchell, the minutes of the June 15, 1990 meeting were approved.

C. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

President Landini announced September 6-7 as the next meeting date.

Remaining meeting dates through the next Annual Meeting were presented as follows:

On a motion by Mr. O'Neill, seconded by Dr. Zietlow, the meeting dates were approved as listed above.

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D. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Chapman Root

President Landini stated it was with personal sadness and a good deal of regret that he reported the death of Chapman Root, a friend and benefactor of Indiana State University. He noted that Chapman and Susan Root were both former students and resident of Terre Haute. Both had a deep affection for ISU. His death was not unexpected since he had been seriously ill for more than a year. Don and Mary Smith were dear personal friends for many years.

Mr. Green has expressed by a letter to Susan Root the regret and condolences of the Board.

Construction Update

Projected completion and move in for Hulman Memorial Student Union is mid-October. Construction on Dede Plaza and Sycamore Way is continuing. The contractor has assured pathways will be available by August 20 for move in and preparation for classes.

President Landini noted it was through the benevolence of Chapman and Susan Root that the Sycamore Way project could be undertaken. While parts of the campus may appear ugly now, one may begin to see a major change taking place in the plaza and walkway areas. The master plan as proposed in 1986 is now being implemented. Unfortunately, there is no good time in the academic year to undertake such projects. Continuing pressure has been placed on the contractors to efficiently move forward.

Dreiser Hall is now vacant as workmen address themselves to asbestos abatement prior to a major renovation of that building. This enterprise will provide accommodations for the Communications Department.

Holmstedt Hall remodeling is nearing completion. Improvements costing approximately \$1 million should be in place before the end of August.

Tirey South (Old Elks Building) is scheduled for demolition. Certain interior features of that building (stained glass skylight, railing, fireplace mantle, marble) will be incorporated on the ninth floor of the Hulman Memorial Student Union. The contract for demolition will be bid with the new construction. The project could begin in October.

President Landini attributed all of these projects and the progress and transition of the campus to the vision and

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forethought of the Board, faculty, students, and administrators. The people of Indiana deserve the best possible facilities.

1991-93 Operations Budget Request

The presidents of the seven public institutions of higher education in Indiana have prepared a video tape message concerning higher education and its funding requirements. The video, "A Commitment to Quality", was shown to the Board.

President Landini commented that the presentation is designed to give special emphasis to the needs of higher education and its importance and value. A special initiative with the Commission for Higher Education and the Governor's Office is also underway to address specific additional requirements. A percentage increase figure, perhaps 5 per cent, will be determined for maintenance of programs. In addition, the Legislature will be asked to add three per cent during each of the four years of the next two biennial budget periods. Such a funding level would total an eight per cent improvement in the operational budget for the previous year. The top priority continues to be improved compensation for faculty and staff. In order to remain competitive, Indiana must be able to retain quality faculty and staff and address pressing equipment needs.

In conclusion Dr. Landini summarized the various items to be included in the operations budget request for 1991-93. He also indicated the detail of the budget request would be included with the agenda for the September meeting.

China Trip

President Landini indicated that in August Vice President Clokey and three faculty members will visit four Chinese universities as part of the planning process for a faculty exchange program. Last year a delegation from China visited the campus. Several American universities including Harvard, Yale and MIT are establishing such agreements. The Chinese universities have also expressed an interest in midwestern universities.

Student Trustee

President Landini reminded the Board this is the last meeting for Craig Pemberton as student trustee. Craig was graduated in May and has accepted employment out of state. Dr. Landini expressed his appreciation and that of his colleagues for Craig's service to the University. He noted that Mr. Pemberton had carried the responsibility of representing 12,000 students with a certain degree of sophistication and brightness.

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E. CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES

The candidates for degrees to be conferred August 17, 1990 were presented in Exhibit A.

Recommendation: Approval of the award of the respective degrees subject to completion of the requirements.

On a motion by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Breeden the recommendation was approved.

F. GRANTS

<u>Recommendation:</u> Ratification of the grants and appropriation of the amounts in accordance with the terms of the individual agreements.

1. <u>Independent Insurance Agents of Indiana, Fund No. 46425, Proposal No. 2881</u>

A grant in the amount of \$1,800 has been received from the Independent Insurance Agents of Indiana for the project entitled, "Insurance Research Proposal", under the direction of Mr. William Minnis, School of Business, for the period June 1, 1990 through August 15, 1990.

2. <u>Western Indiana Private Industry Council, Fund No. 46426, Proposal No. 2882</u>

A grant in the amount of \$3,600 has been received from the Western Indiana Private Industry Council for the project entitled, "Western Indiana Private Industry Council Entrepreneurship Training", under the direction of Mr. William Minnis, School of Business, for the period June 15, 1990 through July 20, 1990.

3. <u>National Science Foundation, Fund No. 46427, Proposal</u>
No. 2824

A grant in the amount of \$14,000 has been received from the National Science Foundation for the project entitled, "Inner Ideal Geometries and Associated Groups in Representations of Affine Lie Algebras", under the direction of Dr. Meighan I. Dillon, Department of Mathematics and Computer Science, for the period June 1, 1990 through December 1, 1990. There is an ISU cash contribution of \$2,795. The University will also waive \$1,093 indirect costs.

4. Indiana Department of Natural Resources/Non-Game, Fund No. 46428, Proposal No. 2870

A grant in the amount of \$4,000 has been received from the Indiana Department of Natural Resources/Non-Game SECTION I PAGE SIX

for the project entitled, "Survey of Mammals at Atterbury Reserve Forces Training Area, Indiana", under the direction of Dr. John O. Whitaker, Jr., Department of Life Sciences, for the period May 1, 1990 through December 31, 1990.

5. <u>Indiana Department of Education, Division of Special</u>
<u>Education, Fund No. 46429, Proposal 2883</u>

A grant in the amount of \$240,000 has been received from the Indiana Department of Education, Division of Special Education, for the project entitled, "Indiana Special Education Administrators' Services (ISEAS) Project", under the direction of Dr. Gary D. Collings, Department of Special Education, for the period July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991.

6. <u>Indiana Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology, Fund No. 46430, Proposal 2799</u>

A grant in the amount of \$7,091 has been received from the Indiana Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology for the project entitled, Systematic Archaeology Survey in Lake and Newton Counties, Northeast, Indiana", under the direction of Mr. C. Michael Anslinger, Department of Anthropology, for the period May 14, 1990 through June 30, 1991. There is an ISU cash contribution of \$2,057. The University will waive \$988 indirect costs.

7. Indiana Chamber of Commerce, Fund No. 46043, Proposal No. 2783

An agreement in the amount of \$67,376 has been received from the Indiana Chamber of Commerce for the Terre Haute Area Small Business Development Center, under the direction of Mr. William C. Minnis, School of Business, for the period January 1, 1990 through December 31, 1990. There is an ISU cash contribution of \$33,688.33. The University will also waive \$33,688.33 indirect costs.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Dr. Zietlow, the recommendation was approved.

G. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT BUDGET REQUEST, 1991-93

The Capital Improvement Budget Request for 1991-93 has been prepared based upon the approved University campus master plan. This request is to be submitted to the Commission for Higher Education and the State Budget Agency of the State of Indiana. Funds are requested under the major categories of general repair and rehabilitation, special repair and rehabilitation (campus improvement) and new construction.

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Dr. Landini commented that representatives from Schmidt Associates were in attendance for the seminar on Thursday afternoon during which the several projects contained in the capital request for 1991-93 were presented and discussed.

Recommendation: Approval of the capital improvement request presented in Exhibit B.

On a motion by Mr. Stelle, seconded by Dr. Anthis, the recommendation was approved.

H. ALLOCATION OF POOLED CAPITAL

The 1990-91 approved budget includes two Unallocated Pooled capital accounts totaling \$1,801,227. Of this amount, \$298,406 will be used for special projects of the University. Therefore, a total of \$1,502,000 will be allocated to the major functional units.

Recommendation: Approval of the allocation of the amounts to the major functional units as follows:

Public Affairs	20,000
Student Affairs	22,000

Total \$1,502,000

The subsequent allocation of the above amounts to deans, academic departments, and administrative units will be reported to the Board of Trustees as an informational item after the transfers have been made.

On a motion by Dr. Anthis, seconded by Mr. O'Neill, the recommendation was approved.

I. AGREEMENTS

1. Agreement with Vigo County School Corporation for Continuation of University School

The most recent agreement with the Vigo County School Corporation for the operation of the University School expired June 30, 1990. Discussions regarding the appropriate relationship between the corporation and the University and the place of Laboratory School in contemporary schools of education has not yet resulted in an agreement acceptable to both entities. Therefore, it has been determined that the most

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appropriate course of action is a one year extension of the current operating agreement. Counsel for the University and the corporation have negotiated the agreement, which is included as Exhibit C.

Recommendation: Approval of the agreement presented in Exhibit C.

2. Agreements for Library Services with Rose Hulman Institute of Technology and St. Mary of the Woods College

In December of 1986, the University entered agreements with St. Mary of the Woods College and Rose Hulman Institute of Technology to provide central site equipment and software for the implementation of an integrated online library system. The result has been a greatly enhanced collection of books and periodicals available to students at each of the three institutions.

Rose Hulman Institute of Technology now wishes to renew the agreement on its original terms and conditions. St. Mary of the Woods, which had originally participated only partially in the program, now wishes to participate fully. Agreements setting forth the understanding of the parties were originally drafted by counsel for ISU and are submitted here for renewal as Exhibit D.

Recommendation: Approval of the agreements presented in Exhibit D.

3. <u>University Food Service Agreement with Marriott Corporation</u>

One of the components of the University's food service agreement with Marriott Corporation is the requirement that Marriott participate in the upgrading of University food service facilities. The first major project under that agreement is the complete renovation and redecoration of the Lincoln Quadrangles food service area, to be completed during the summer of 1990.

Counsel for the University and Marriott, working through the Vice President for Student Affairs, have negotiated an agreement that meets the concerns of all involved in this project. It was included as Exhibit E.

Recommendation: Approval of the agreement presented in Exhibit E.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Dr. Zietlow, the recommendations were approved.

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J. NORMAL HALL RESTORATION

At the October 1989 meeting authority was granted for the selection of Ratio Architects, Inc. as the project architect for the restoration of Normal Hall. The project is to be funded by private gifts and benefactions. Preliminary schematic drawings have now been completed.

Mr. Winchell expressed his understanding that in October the selection of Ratio Architects was approved by the Board but that separate action would be needed to continue with the restoration.

President Landini stated that he interpreted the October action as a Board decision to restore Normal Hall. The approval today in effect would authorize Mr. Dahl to find donors for the project. Dr. Zietlow agreed that this was her understanding.

Dr. Landini noted the front steps will be restored, the addition removed, and the attractive features of the building will be highlighted. Mr. Winchell said he understood what is proposed but only the engagement of architects was approved.

President Landini agreed that was the substance of the action taken at the October meeting. Mr. Green then read the item from the October minutes.

Mr. Winchell indicated he was not prepared to vote for the project. Mr. Stelle asked about the cost of the restoration. Mr. Dahl responded that approximately \$5 million was the best estimate. The restored building would house University Archives, Alumni Affairs, ISU Foundation, and Development Offices. Mr. Winchell said he remained unconvinced that this is a justifiable expenditure.

Mr. Breeden commented that the impact of the project goes far beyond cost, that Normal Hall is a very meaningful element in the history and tradition of the campus, and that he had presumed the Board was in agreement. Dr. Zietlow stated that that was also her opinion. She emphasized the real issue is the preservation of a very important landmark on the campus. The restoration of Normal Hall will be an enhancement and major asset to the campus as well as a historical link.

Mr. O'Neill said that while he tended to agree with the project he recalled some concerns expressed about cost and use. He felt more specific information would be helpful. Dr. Landini stated that authority to proceed with the next step is needed before specific cost figures can be given. Mr. Green indicated the funds will be raised through the ISU Foundation.

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President Landini suggested withdrawing the item until the September meeting. Mr. Breeden felt this was unnecessary since this topic has been discussed for more than a year. The project will be completed with private funds and he thought the Board was in agreement the building should be kept and restored. Dr. Zietlow also expressed a desire to more forward with the project.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Authority to engage Ratio Architects, Inc. to prepare design development drawings and final construction drawings and specifications.

On a motion by Dr. Zietlow, seconded by Mr. Stelle, the recommendation was approved. Mr. Winchell voted no.

AGREEMENT FOR CONTINUED OPERATION OF A LABORATORY SCHOOL BY INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY WITH THE VIGO COUNTY SCHOOL CORPORATION

THIS AGREEMENT, entered this _____ of ____, 1990, by and between the Indiana State University Board of Trustees, hereinafter referred to as ISU, and the Vigo County School Corporation, hereinafter referred to as Corporation,

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS there has for some time existed a relationship between ISU and Corporation whereby Corporation provided students and ISU provided a school for their instruction,

AND WHEREAS, this school, currently known as "University School", provides instruction to children from kindergarten to the ninth grade,

AND WHEREAS, the most recent agreement between ISU and Corporation setting forth the terms and conditions whereby University School was to be operated expired June 30, 1990 before full and complete consideration of a successor agreement could be concluded,

AND WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of both Corporation, ISU, and the children who have been and will be served at University School to continue the programs and operations of the University School until such time as other and different arrangements might be made,

NOW, THEREFORE, FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL COVENANTS CONTAINED HEREIN, THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

1. Extension of Former Contract for Provision of Services.

The former agreement existing between ISU and Corporation, entered into September 23, 1981 and continuing to and including June 30, 1990 is hereby reaffirmed (with exception of its term of existence) as the full understanding and agreement of the parties for the operation of the University School. Both parties agree

to be bound by the terms and conditions of the former agreement and to incorporate them by reference as the terms of this agreement.

2. Contract Term and Review.

This agreement shall become effective immediately upon its approval by the governing boards of both parties and shall continue in effect until June 30, 1991. The parties further agree that, immediately upon the approval of this agreement by their respective governing boards, they will enter into discussion regarding the future relationship of the parties and the provision of services by and between them, if any, upon the conclusion of the term of this agreement.

ONLINE LIBRARY SYSTEM AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, Indiana State University Library has initially purchased Central Site Equipment and Software (described in Exhibit "A" attached and incorporated by reference) for the implementation of an integrated online library system, and

WHEREAS, Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology desires to participate and make a financial contribution to the operation and maintenance of the system,

This agreement is entered into this <u>lst</u> day of <u>July</u>, 199<u>0</u>, between Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana (hereafter the UNIVERSITY) and <u>Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology</u> (hereafter the LIBRARY).

1. DEFINITIONS

The following definitions shall apply to the interpretation of this agreement.

- (a) The "Online System" shall refer to a system consisting of software and hardware and a generated database that provides online computer assisted library services to the LIBRARY.
- (b) "Equipment" shall refer to computer hardware, software, and other manufactured items used in the operation of the Online System.
- (c) "Central Site Equipment: shall refer to equipment (exclusive of terminals, printers, and associated telecommunication equipment, i.e., the Local Site Equipment) purchased and owned by the UNIVERSITY for the operation of the Online System. The Central Site Equipment comprises all equipment listed in Exhibit "A". Exhibit "A" will be updated annually on October 1 of each year to reflect the actual inventory of Central Site Equipment.
- (d) "Local Site Equipment" shall refer to equipment owned and purchased by the LIBRARY. Such equipment shall include but is not limited to terminals, printers, multiplexers, modems, terminal controllers, and barcode readers.
- (e) "Database" shall refer to any and all data or information entered into the Online System by any library.
- (f) "NOTIS" shall refer to software for an integrated library system created by and purchased from Northwestern University.

5.2 A breakdown of the contract sum, which will become the Schedule of Values for billing purposes, is attached as Exhibit "C". A list of items excluded from the scope and budget for this project is attached as Exhibit "D".

ARTICLE VI

PROGRESS PAYMENTS

- 6.1 On the first day of each month, Marriott shall submit a requisition to Owner covering the work accomplished through the 25th day of each month (or if the 20th day is a holiday, the first working day thereafter).
- 6.2 Final Payment, constituting the entire unpaid balance of the Contract Sum, shall be paid by Owner to Marriott on a prorated basis as applicable, thirty (30) days after the earlier of: (1) acceptance of the Project by Owner; or (2) issuance of all final governmental approvals relating to Marriott's work, and use of the Project by Owner or Owner's designee for its intended purpose.
- 6.3 Marriott A&C will forward its monthly billings directly to Marriott F&SM in the format corresponding to Exhibits "A & B" of this Contract. F&SM will re-bill the Owner in the same format, for the Owners portion of the contract as outlined in Article V.
- 6.4 Forms to be used for billings are attached as Exhibits A and B.

ARTICLE VII

GENERAL

- 7.1 Any notice required to be given by the terms and provisions of this Contract or any law or government regulation, either by Marriott or Owner (or which either party may desire to give hereunder) shall be in writing and shall be personally delivered, forwarded by registered or certified mail (return receipt requested), by overnight delivery service, or by telegram, and shall be addressed to the party hereto at its address as herein stated to the attention of Reed Kidder for the Owner or J. Harold Allen ("the Marriott Agent") for Marriott. Either party may change the address to which any notice referred to herein is to be sent by giving written notice of such change of address to the other party in the manner provided above. Notice personally delivered pursuant to this article shall be effective on the date of delivery. Notice given by mail, telegram, or overnight delivery shall be effective on date of receipt, or, in the absence of delivery, on the date of attempted delivery.

SCHEDULE A

Design Management Services

ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES:

- Retain the services of all necessary design consultants and manage the total design of a facility including the preparation of all drawings and specifications. The consultants to be retained to perform these basic design services are architectural, interior design, structural, mechanical and electrical. Other consultants may be required if concealed, unusual or special project conditions are encountered.
- O Conduct inspections of the facility at predetermined intervals during the construction phase for conformance with Marriott quality standards and criteria and the contractors construction schedule.

SCHEDULE B

Construction Management Services

Construction Management Services

- 1. <u>General</u>. Provide key personnel to manage the entire construction process to include estimating, bidding (or negotiation) and award of contracts, contract administration, scheduling, supervision, coordination and acceptance of all work.
 - General. Marriott shall function as construction manager for the Project by (i) monitoring all aspects of the construction of the Project, (ii) overseeing, on behalf of Owner, the efforts of the "Contractors" (as defined below), (iii) employing its standard construction management system and procedures, and (iv) consulting in every reasonable manner with the representatives of Owner.
- 2. <u>Job Structure</u>. It is the intention of the parties that Marriott shall enter into a construction contract with a General Contractor, who shall have the responsibility for supervision and execution of the work of the major building trades, and one or more other Contractors who shall be responsible for the supervision and execution of other aspects of the construction. The General Contractor and all other contractors who shall have a direct contractual relationship with Marriott shall hereinafter be referred to as the

"Contractors". All entities contracting directly with any Contractor as a subcontractor shall hereinafter be referred to as "Subcontractors".

- 3. <u>Schedule</u>. Marriott will submit a construction schedule to the Owner for review prior to the commencement of work. Marriott will make reasonable arrangements with the Owner to coordinate the work with the operational requirements of the Owner.
- 4. <u>Personnel</u>. Marriott will assign a Project Coordinator for the Project. The Project Coordinator will be responsible for supervising the work of all contractors, and for coordinating the work with the authorized representative of the Owner. Dayto-day site supervision will be performed by the general superintendent for the General Contractor, who will be specifically qualified and approved by Marriott.
- 5. <u>Construction Management Responsibilities</u>. During the construction of the Project, Marriott shall provide the following services as Owner's Construction Manager:
 - a. Administrative management and related services as required to coordinate the work of the Contractors and Subcontractors with each other and with the activities and responsibilities of Marriott, and the Owner, in order to complete the Project in accordance with the approved Design and Construction Documents.
 - b. Schedule and conduct pre-construction, construction and progress meetings to discuss such matters as procedures, problems and schedules. The pre-construction meetings shall clearly set forth to all Contractors, Subcontractors and Consultants, the construction management procedures to be employed and the necessity to maintain necessary personnel on the Project in order to meet the Schedule.
 - c. Monitor the Schedule on a daily basis, including activity sequences and durations, processing of shop drawings, product data and samples, and delivery of products requiring long lead time procurement.
 - d. Ensure satisfactory performance from each of the Contractors, and take corrective action, when necessary.
 - e. Determine in general that the work of the Contractors is being performed in accordance with the requirements of the Design and Construction documents. Use best efforts to guard the Owner against defects and deficiencies in the work. Reject work which does not conform to the requirements of the Construction Documents.

- f. Coordinate all scope changes which may become necessary during construction of the Project. Assemble documentation for scope changes, including projected costs from all Contractors, or others, affected. Negotiate changes with the Contractors and prepare appropriate change orders.
- g. Have authority to order minor changes in the work without prior approval of Owner. A "minor change" in the work, as referred to in the preceding sentence, shall mean any single non-structural construction related change which does not result in a delay in the completion of the Project, and does not increase or decrease the budget nor cost to Owner.
- h. Determine and pay on a monthly basis, the amounts owed to all Contractors based upon an evaluation of the labor and materials in place and the materials on site.
- i. Maintain proper accounts for all funds expended in the course of completing construction of the Project.
- j. Manage day-to-day communication between Owner, Marriott, the Contractors, the Subcontractors and local, state and federal officials having jurisdiction over the Project.
- k. Implement a procedure for final punchout of the Project, including all construction, interior finishes, furnishings, systems and equipment, in accordance with the Schedule and scope of work.
- 1. Make regular on-site inspections of all the work to check the quality and progress of the work and to monitor construction activities.
- m. Coordinate its activities with the activities of the Contractors and Subcontractors in providing necessary supervision for receiving, handling, setting-in-place and installation of all furniture, carpet, drapery, artwork, and similar decor items.
- n. Inspect all items procured pursuant to Section 1.3 hereof, as such items are delivered to the designated warehouse or the site, to determine that the goods received conform to the applicable purchase order with respect to specifications and quantity.
- o. Contract for all necessary testing services and other such miscellaneous services as are required and necessary for the proper completion of construction of the Project.

SCHEDULE C

Procurement Services

Procure or authorize procurement of long lead items and provide for the warehousing, delivery and installation in accordance with the plans and schedule. Items which are held in a campus or public warehouse will be considered as delivered to site and are to be included in monthly payment requests accordingly. This includes all items previously identified in the advance procurement authorization.

SCHEDULE D

Owner's Responsibilities

- 1. The Owner shall designate a single representative authorized to act on the Owner's behalf with respect to the Project. The Owner or such authorized representative shall examine documents submitted by the Marriott Corporation and shall promptly render decisions pertaining thereto to avoid delay in the orderly progress of the Work.
- 2. The Owner may appoint a single on-site project representative to observe the Work and to have such other responsibilities as the Owner and Marriott agree in writing prior to execution of contract.
- 3. The Owner shall cooperate with Marriott in securing building and other permits, licenses and inspections. The fees for such permits, licenses and inspections are included in the Contract Sum.
- 4. If the Owner observes or otherwise becomes aware of a fault or defect in the Work or nonconformity with the Design or Construction Documents, the Owner shall give prompt written notice thereof to Marriott.
- 5. The Owner shall furnish required information and services and shall promptly render decisions pertaining thereto to avoid delay in the orderly progress of the design and construction.
- 6. The Owner shall communicate with contractors only through Marriott.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

Section 1. Compliance with Law

Marriott shall comply with all applicable codes, laws, rules and regulations of federal, state or local authorities. Marriott shall be responsible for initiating, maintaining and supervising all safety precautions and programs in connection with its Work and shall take all necessary precautions for the safety of its employees and all other persons who may be affected by Marriott's work.

Section 2. Clean-up

Marriott shall provide for all daily clean-up and disposal offsite of all trash and debris as required. When the Project is completed, Marriott shall employ experienced persons or a professional team to make a Final Clean-Up of the Project. Such Clean-Up shall cause the Project to be suitable for occupancy and shall leave all surfaces, including windows, equipment, finishes, fixtures, furnishings and other similar items in a condition requiring only ordinary care to maintain.

Section 3. Equal Employment Opportunity

Marriott shall comply with Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965 (41 C.F.R. 60-250), which is administered by the United States Department of Labor Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, with the relevant rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor pertaining thereto, and with all related non-discrimination, non-segregation, affirmative action, veterans employment, and handicapped employment laws, rules, regulations, and orders (collectively, the "EEO Requirements"). Marriott will furnish upon request information and reports required by the EEO Requirements. Marriott shall include the provisions of this Section in every subcontract or purchase order, unless exempted by the EEO Requirements, so that such provisions will be binding upon each contractor, subcontractor, or vendor performing services or providing, materials relating to the Work.

Section 4. Changed Conditions and Delays

Owner shall compensate Marriott in accordance with Section 6B below for any additional costs incurred due to changed or unknown conditions encountered during the prosecution of the Work, including but not limited to the following:

- A. Correction of pre-existing code violations.
- B. Correction of structural problems not identifiable by a visual inspection.
- C. Changes in codes or code interpretation.

In addition, if Marriott is delayed at any time in the progress of the Work by any act or neglect of Owner or by changes ordered in the scope of the Work, or by fire, adverse weather conditions not reasonably anticipated, or any other causes beyond the control of Marriott, then the required completion date or duration set forth in the Construction Project Schedule shall be extended by the amount of time that Marriott shall have been delayed thereby.

Section 5. Changes in Work

- A. Owner may, at any time, by a written order, make changes to the drawings and specifications ("Change in Work"). Marriott shall notify Owner of any changed conditions or Owner directives which potentially increase the Contract Sum or completion date within forty-eight hours of becoming aware of said potential increases.
- B. When a condition is identified which requires a Change in Work or a revision to the scope of Marriott's work outside the guidelines of Schedule B, Section 5G, Marriott shall submit to Owner a proposal request which will stipulate details and terms of the change or revision. Marriott and Owner shall agree in advance to the total lump sum cost of the Change in Work, which lump sum shall include labor, materials, overhead and profit.

Section 6. Insurance

- A. Marriott will provide and maintain without interruption from date of commencement of the Work until date of final payment, such insurance as will fully protect Marriott and Owner from any and all claims for personal injury or property damage which may arise out of or result from this Contract. Such insurance shall be carried with insurance companies licensed to do business in the state where the Project is located. Such insurance shall include:
 - I. Worker's Compensation insurance including \$2,000,000 employer's liability on all employees working for Marriott. Such insurance will comply with applicable state workers' compensation laws.
 - II. Comprehensive general liability insurance including premises-operations, completed operations (which shall be maintained for two (2) years after final payment), independent contractors, and contractual liability covering Marriott's obligations under Paragraph 8 Indemnification, for bodily injury or property damage with a combined single limit of not less than \$2,000,000 each occurrence. (General Aggregates shall apply specifically to this Project and shall apply specifically to this Project and shall be endorsed on

the policy.) All such insurance and certificates shall be reasonably acceptable to Owner.

III. Automobile liability insurance including all owned, non-owned, and hired vehicles used in conjunction with this Contract for bodily injury or property damage with a combined single limit of not less than \$2,000,000 each occurrence.

B. Waiver of Recovery

Owner waives all rights of recovery against Marriott for damages to property covered by the insurance required under this Contract. Marriott waives all rights of recovery against Owner for any losses covered by the insurance required under this Contract and for any losses which fall within insurance policy deductibles.

Section 7. Indemnification

- A. Marriott shall be responsible for any and all injury or damage to any person and/or property, including loss of life, arising out of or in connection with Work performed or to be performed under this Contract, except for any such cost, damage or expenses which arise as a result of Owner's negligence. Marriott shall further indemnify, defend and hold Owner harmless from any and all loss, damage or expense (including attorney fees) from any such injury, damage, or death except for any such loss, damage or expenses which arise as a result of Owner's negligence.
- B. Marriott also agrees to defend, indemnify and save Owner harmless from all costs, damages, or expenses, including attorney's fees, incurred by Owner by virtue of any claim or claims whatsoever filed by any subcontractor, laborer or material supplier, making claims arising from work performed pursuant to this Contract except for any such cost, damage or expenses which arise as a result of Owner's negligence. Additionally, Marriott shall, within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of notice by Owner, take all steps necessary and proper for the release and discharge of any lien filed on the project by any such subcontractor, laborer, or material supplier.

Section 8. Cooperation

A policy of full cooperation shall prevail between the parties and their authorized representatives with respect to all matters contemplated by this Contract. Owner specifically agrees to review all documents promptly and respond within a reasonable period of time.

Section 9. Independent Contractor

Marriott agrees that it is engaged as an independent contractor and that as such is not an agent of Owner. Marriott further agrees that it will be solely responsible for the payment of all taxes and benefits required by law for said employees or agents, without liability to Owner.

Section 10. Drawings

All drawings, specifications and copies thereof furnished by Marriott are and shall remain the property of Marriott. They are to be used only with respect to this Project and will not be used in any manner on any other project. Marriott will provide Owner with full set of Drawings and Specifications, together with any modifications or supplements thereto. Owner may retain such copies for its use in the course of its operations and maintenance in and about the hospital property and the project site.

Section 11. Non-waiver of Rights

No action or failure to act by either party or any of their agents or employees shall constitute a waiver of any right or duty afforded either party under the Contract, nor shall any such action or failure to act constitute approval of or acquiescence in any breach thereunder, except as specifically agreed to in writing.

Section 12. Disputes

All claims, disputes and other matters and questions arising out of or relating to this Contract or the breach thereof, shall be decided by a court of law having jurisdiction over same.

Section 13. Non-Assignability

Neither party to this Contract shall assign its rights or obligations without prior consent from the other party.

Section 14. Entire Agreement

This Contract represents the entire and integrated agreement between Marriott and Owner and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations or agreements, either written or oral. This Contract may be amended only by written instrument signed by both Marriott and Owner.

I. COMPLIANCE WITH DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES ACT AMENDMENTS OF 1989

The Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended by the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989, requires that each institution of higher education receiving federal funds implement a drug prevention program on its campus and certify its compliance with the law to the Secretary of Education on or before October 1, 1990. The act requires clear delineation of standards of conduct required of employees and students, educational programs and materials which are to be available to them, and sanctions which will apply for failure to meet expectations.

An ad hoc committee, involving representatives of Academic Affairs, Administrative Affairs, Business Affairs, and Student Affairs, has been working with University counsel during the summer to insure the University's compliance. Failure to comply could result in the loss of federal funds.

The University is currently publishing materials for students, and employees which set forth its policies. Policies exist in documents previously approved by this Board, such as the Code of Student Conduct, and materials distributed through the Office of Personnel Services and the Employee Assistance Program. Programs for employees and students to fully explain the law and University policies are scheduled for the fall semester.

Recommendation: Affirmation of existing policies regarding drug and alcohol possession, use or distribution by employees and students of the University and approval of the following policy statement:

Indiana State University policy prohibits the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of controlled substances or alcohol in any part of the University or at any University activity. Legal use of alcohol may be permitted on campus only if approved by the President or his designee.

Any employee or student who is in violation of University policy or is convicted of a drug statute violation arising out of conduct occurring in the workplace or at a University activity will be subject to any one or a combination of the following:

- a. A verbal warning
- b. A written warning

- Disciplinary probation (students)
- d. Referral to the Employee Assistance Program for evaluation, assessment, and counseling for possible treatment
- e. Required participation in a drug or alcohol rehabilitation program
- f. Suspension from duty and/or enrollment
- g. Termination of employment under standard University procedures

Any employee or student referred for treatment or other rehabilitation will be required to complete the prescribed treatment as a condition of continued employment or enrollment.

J. AGREEMENTS

Wabash Valley Radiologists, Inc.

The University Student Health Center is in need of the services of a roentgenologist. Physicians at the Wabash Valley Radiologists, Inc. are qualified by profession and training to provide these services. The proposed contract between Wabash Valley Radiologists, Inc. and the University replaces the agreement with Benjamin S.P. Ko, M.D., who resigned. A copy of the agreement is presented in Exhibit A.

Recommendation: Approval of the agreement presented in Exhibit A effective July 1, 1990.

WHEREAS, DOCTOR has offered his services as a roentgenologist to the UNIVERSITY as such time as may be convenient to both parties, and the UNIVERSITY has extended an offer to DOCTOR for use of his services.

WHEREAS, the parties have agreed that DOCTOR will work in conjunction with the Student Health Center of the UNIVERSITY in order to provide radiology service on a fee basis.

NOW, THEREFORE, FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL COVENANT CONTAINED HEREIN, THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. DOCTOR shall provide medical service to the UNIVERSITY
 Student Health Center where DOCTOR shall conduct radiological
 studies, read X-ray films and provide such other services as may be
 compatible with this medical specialty.
- 2. For the services rendered, DOCTOR shall bill the UNIVERSITY at least monthly, in accordance with the fee schedule attached hereto, made a part hereof and marked Exhibit "A".

- 3. UNIVERSITY shall make available to DOCTOR the radiological equipment which DOCTOR may need to provide the services required by the UNIVERSITY, but in no event shall the UNIVERSITY be required to purchase additional equipment beyond what is now installed at the UNIVERSITY Student Health Center.
- 4. DOCTOR shall read all x-rays involving the skull and the complete vertebral column.
- 5. UNIVERSITY physicians shall view all x-rays taken by the radiologist technician. X-rays showing pathology or if he/she desires DOCTOR to interpret the x-ray, DOCTOR will read the film.
- 6. At least 10% of all negative x-ray films shall randomly be read by DOCTOR.
- 7. DOCTOR assumes full responsibility for his own acts, omissions, errors, or wrongdoing arising in or out of the services performed pursuant to this agreement, and DOCTOR further agrees to carry his own medical malpractice insurance in an amount of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) and shall provide UNIVERSITY with a Certificate of Insurance showing such insurance coverage, naming Indiana State University as an additional insured under said policy.
- 8. It is understood and agreed by and between the parties that DOCTOR will, at all times mentioned in this Agreement, retain the status of an independent contractor and in no event shall contractor be considered an employee of the University.
- 9. The parties hereby agree that this contract shall remain in effect for a period of five (5) years from the date hereof except that, after the first anniversary date of said contract, either party

shall have the unconditional right to terminate said contract by the giving of one hundred twenty days (120) prior written notice of intention to terminate. Notice shall be considered to have been given when delivered in person or when posted by registered mail, postage prepaid, and properly addressed to the party to whom said such notice is to be given.

SECTION I

J. AGREEMENTS

Student Legal Counseling

On September 18, 1981, the Indiana State University Board of Trustees authorized the University to enter into agreements to provide legal counseling for students. The Vice President for Student Affairs has assigned to the Director of the Student Counseling Center the responsibility for the administration of student legal counseling as a part of the Student Counseling Center's programs.

Contracts were signed with two Terre Haute attorneys to provide a maximum of four (4) hours per week at a rate of fifty dollars (\$50) per hour during each of the fall and spring semesters.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approval of the continuation of Student Legal Counseling Agreements.

M. HULMAN MEMORIAL STUDENT UNION/TIREY HALL RENTAL RATES

Facility rental rates for Hulman Memorial Student Union must be established before the opening of the facility. In addition rental rates for several spaces which are available for campus and public use in Tirey Hall should be increased.

The rental rates apply to all non-University groups for the use of HMSU and Tirey facilities, including Tilson Music Hall. There is no charge for the use of space in either facility for recognized student organizations, departments of the University, and staff organizations recognized by the University. The Hulman Memorial Student Union Board and the Student Government Association are not charged for their use of Tilson Music Hall.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approval of the facility rental rates for Hulman Memorial Student Union and Tirey Hall as presented in Exhibit C effective September 1, 1990.

MINUTES INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OCTOBER 19, 1990

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in regular session at 4:00 p.m. on Friday, October 19, 1990, in the Trustees Meeting Room, 11th Floor, School of Business.

Trustees present: Dr. Anthis, Mr. Breeden, Mr. Green, Mr. O'Neill, Mr. Smith, Mr. Stelle, Mr. Winchell, and Dr. Zietlow. A student trustee has not been appointed by the Governor.

President Landini, Vice Presidents Clokey, Dahl, Edgerton, Graham, and Schafer were present. Also attending were Professor Richard Spear, Chairperson of the University Faculty Senate, and Mr. Eugene Dooley, President of the Student Government Association.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Green called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

SECTION I

A. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

On a motion by Mr. O'Neill, seconded by Mr. Stelle, the minutes were approved as presented.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next meeting will be on December 6-7, 1990.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Homecoming

President Landini noted that homecoming events are scheduled for Saturday. The parade is scheduled for 9:00 a.m. and other activities are scheduled throughout the day. Graduates will return to the campus, and there will be a reception and banquet honoring the distinguished alumni. Special class reunions are also planned. The 1990 distinguished alumni are Ruth Schuessler Jones, Chairperson of the Political Science Department at Arizona State University; Duane Klueh, an emeritus professor in the Department of Physical Education and former head basketball and tennis coach; and Z. Mae Jimison, a judge in the Marion County court system. All three are distingished graduates of the institution and have

been awarded this honor by the Alumni Association. The parade marshall is Paul Siebenmorgan, who served on the ISU Board of Trustees for 8 years. He is also a graduate of the institution and received his medical degree from Indiana University.

Student Trustee

The Student Government Association has forwarded to the Office of the Governor names and identities of eleven individuals for consideration as a replacement for Craig Pemberton as a member of the Board of Trustees. President Landini noted Craig served one year, and upon graduation accepted a position with the Lilly Corporation. The replacement appointee will complete the term which runs through June 1991.

Budget

The budget request for 1991-93 has been submitted to state agencies. Presentations have been made to the Commission for Higher Education and also to the State Budget Committee. The seven institution presidents made a joint presentation. There is individuality in the seven requests but there is also a body of common principles all adhere to in bringing the budget message to the Legislature. That message includes an appeal for support of an adjustment in the base budget of 5.5 percent in the first year and 5.5 percent in the second year for inflation. An increase in the base budget to respond to enrollment changes and a 3 percent improvement for quality improvement as part of the commitment to quality. It is too early to predict the outcome since there will be many more presentations and speeches around the state by the seven presidents.

A major concern is the retention and attraction of faculty and professional staff. During the 1960's there was a surge of enrollment and an increase in the number of faculty was necessary. Those faculty members are now reaching retirement age. Institutions of higher education in the nation are faced with the issue of how to replace those retiring with individuals of like experience and commitment. We cannot guarantee that those numbers will be replenished. In addition, a number of faculty members have been lost to other institutions and industry because of higher salaries. This is a matter of considerable importance to the state.

President Landini emphasized that the University cannot rely on the benefaction of the appropriation by the Legislature for improvement in salaries. Internal reallocation will be necessary. Each of the Vice Presidents has been charged to look within their budgets to find

resources for an additional 3% improvement in salaries. Higher levels of efficiency and productivity within the institution will be expected. It will be done without any erosion of academic quality. The Vice Presidents are working within their areas in seeking procedures by which this realization can take place.

Advanced Technology Center

Congressman John Myers has introduced legislation in the Congress which calls for an appropriation of almost 5 million dollars for an advanced technology center on the campus. The proposal must still be approved by the Senate and by the President of the United States. A number of obstacles have been overcome. This is a promising development. The ISU School of Technology is among the best in the country.

Withdrawal of Personnel Item

President Landini indicated that he was withdrawing the personnel item in Section III in the agenda concerning William Tesh pending consideration by University faculty government.

D. FEE REMISSIONS AND OTHER SCHOLARSHIPS

The new awards of academic scholarships for the 1990-91 academic year and the athletic scholarships for the fall semester were presented in Exhibit A.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approval of the awards.

On a motion by Mr. Smith, seconded by Dr. Zietlow, the recommendation was approved.

University in-kind contribution is \$14,610.77. The University will waive \$851.72 indirect costs.

There is an ISU in-kind contribution of \$2,400. The University will waive indirect costs of \$24,477.

11. <u>Wabash Valley Human Services, Inc., Fund No. 46451, Proposal No. 2916</u>

An agreement in the amount of \$5,100 has been received from Wabash Valley Human Services, Inc. for the Vincennes CDA/Head Start Training, under the direction of Dr. Jan McCarthy, Department of Elementary and Early Childhood Education, for the period July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991. There is a tuition waiver of \$2,265 plus the University will waive \$918 indirect costs.

15. Elsa U. Pardee Foundation, Fund No. 46455, Proposal No. 2856

A grant in the amount of \$39,521.40 has been received from the Elsa U. Pardee Foundation for the project entitled, "Augmenting Antitumor Immunity by Idiotype Vaccine," under the direction of Dr. Swapan K. Ghosh, Department of Life Sciences, for the period January 1, 1990 through December 31, 1991.

16. Tri Cap, Inc., Fund No. 46456, Proposal No. 2925

An agreement in the amount of \$6,000 has been received from Tri Cap, Inc. for the CDA Head Start Training, under the direction of Dr. Jan McCarthy, Department of Elementary and Early Childhood Education, for the period July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991. G. AGREEMENTS

1. Safety Management Student Interns

For some time, the University has placed student interns as a portion of their academic preparation in various programs of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. Consistent with University practice to utilize standard agreements for such placements, the proposed Agreement for Placement of a Safety Management Intern has been prepared by counsel in consultation with appropriate faculty.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approval of the proposed standard agreements for placement of student interns in Safety Management and Environmental Health as presented in Exhibit C.

2. Children's Learning Center at-Hamilton Center

The University School has been providing an integrated preschool program for four year olds from the Children's Learning Center at Hamilton Center. The revised extension agreement has been reviewed by University counsel.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approval of the revised extension agreement with Hamilton Center, Inc., as presented in Exhibit D.

3. Mills Aviation and Brown Flying School

For several years, the University has maintained a relationship with Mills Aviation and Brown Flying School to provide instruction to students in our Aerospace Administration, Professional Pilot Technology, and General Aviation Flight Technology Programs. The agreement between the University and Mills and Brown set forth the structure for administration of the program; students contract individually with Mills or Brown for actual instruction.

The agreements are substantively the same as those used for the last several years.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approval of the agreements as presented in Exhibits E and F.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mr. Smith, the recommendation was approved.

H. RENOVATION OF SYCAMORE TOWERS DINING

Residential Life has recommended implementation of phase two of the 1988 Food Service Master Plan prepared by the consulting firm of Birchfield Foodsystem of Annapolis, Maryland. Phase one, the renovation of Lincoln Quad Dining, was completed during the summer of 1990.

Phase two involves the renovation of the Sycamore Towers dining and serving areas. The estimated cost of the project is \$800,000. Funding for the project will come from the capital investment commitment made by the Marriott Corporation as part of the current food services contract.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Authorization to seek the necessary State agency approvals and authority to engage an architectural firm to design the project.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mr. Stelle, the recommendation was approved.

I. MODERNIZATION OF SYCAMORE TOWERS FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

The existing fire alarm system at Sycamore Towers is twentyfive years old and does not meet the current State of Indiana Uniform Fire Code.

The University plans to modernize the fire alarm system at an estimated cost of \$400,000. The project will be funded from Residence Hall Reserve Funds.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Authorization to seek the necessary State agency approvals to modernize the Sycamore Towers fire alarm system at an estimated cost of \$400,000.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Dr. Anthis, the recommendation was approved.

COOPERATIVE CLASSROOM FOR FOUR-YEAR-OLDS AT UNIVERSITY SCHOOL AGREEMENT

Children's Learning Center of Hamilton Center, Inc. and Indiana State University agree to cooperatively provide an integrated preschool program for four-year-olds.

Indiana State University and Children's Learning Center agree to the following:

- 1. Maintain confidentiality regarding information on children enrolled in the program.
- 2. Maintain current medical and social information regarding each child, all pertinent emergency phone numbers, and records of parental permission for outside activities.
- 3. Immediately seek appropriate professional help in the event of a serious accident or illness and contact the parent, guardian or named emergency contact person.
- 4. Record daily attendance and report the attendance of each child to the appropriate staff of the Children's Learning Center and Indiana State University.
- 5. In the event that transportation is provided, maintain compliance with all state and federal laws and regulation regarding appropriate driver's license, as well as use of car seats and seat belts.
- 6. No form of corporal punishment/actions will be engaged in that might damage the child's self-esteem or emotional growth.
- 7. Participate in a pre-planning conference prior to placement of children in order to outline service delivery.
- 8. Maintain an "open door" invitation enabling parents of children to visit at any time in order to observe progress.

Indiana State University agrees to fulfill the following responsibilities:

- 1. Provide classroom space, materials and equipment for the program which shall be housed at the University School.
- 2. Assign one full-time teacher, one part-time teacher's aide and one graduate assistant for children with special needs to the program.
- 3. Maintain a ratio of 15 children per classroom instructor and a limit of 20 children.

- 4. Procure and maintain sufficient policies of insurance to insure the activities of the preschool program. ISU shall submit to Hamilton Center, upon request, copies of certificates of said insurance.
- 5. Provide for supervision of preservice teachers and university students who are assigned for observation/participation.

Children's Learning Center agrees to fulfill the following responsibilities:

- 1. Assign one teacher, one Foster Grandparent, and one teaching assistant--as requested for special activities or emergencies.
- 2. Provide an agreed upon amount of \$550.00 for materials and supplies.
- 3. Provide any special therapies (e.g. speech therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy) needed by the children with special needs placed through the Children's Learning Center. These special therapies may be delivered in the University School.
- 4. Provide any needed adaptive equipment for children with special needs placed through the Children's Learning Center.
- 5. Initiate and conduct annual case conferences for children with special needs placed through the Children's Learning Center. Case conferences shall include the child's family and staff of both the Children's Learning Center and Indiana State University.
- 6. Provide as least four hours of inservice annually for staff.

AGREEMENT TO PROVIDE FLIGHT TRAINING

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this first day of July, 1990, by and between INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES, hereinafter referred to as the "UNIVERSITY", and Mills Aviation, Inc., hereinafter referred to as the "CONTRACTOR".

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, the UNIVERSITY has initiated within its School of Technology programs in Aerospace Administration, Professional Pilot Technology, and General Aviation Flight Technology which will be available to the students of Indiana State University.

WHEREAS, the CONTRACTOR owns and operates an incorporated flight school with all the necessary instructors, aircraft, and supporting facilities.

WHEREAS, the CONTRACTOR has proposed to the UNIVERSITY that it be permitted to conduct the in-flight training and participate in related cooperative education endeavors for Indiana State University students in conjunction with the UNIVERSITY'S aviation program.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained the parties agree, as follows:

I. <u>FLIGHT TRAINING:</u>

The CONTRACTOR shall provide to flight students of the UNIVERSITY the following described flight training at the place, price, quantity, and for the term indicated, subject to Terms and Conditions attached hereto and made a part hereof:

A. Type of Training:

Private Pilot Commercial Pilot Instrument Rating Flight Instructor Certificate Multi-Engine Rating Cooperative Experiences Published Course Requirements The following activities conducted in connection with the UNIVERSITY'S flight training program shall be and are considered part of the contract and shall be subject to and part of the conditions contained in said contract:

- 1. Participation in Indiana State University flight team activities
- 2. Competition in National Intercollegiate Flying Association Meets
- 3. Faculty proficiency flying

The above activities are conducted in conjunction with and subject to all terms and conditions of this contract to provide flight training for Indiana State University.

B. Hours of Training and Costs:

The minimum required hours of flight and ground instruction are governed by Federal Aviation Regulations, Part 61.

The costs for aircraft rental and flight instruction will be generally based upon the normal market price reduced by approximately fifteen percent for Indiana State University students. Specific rates will be negotiated and agreed upon annually during or before June and will be published and in effect on July 1 each year. The agreed flying costs must be competitive with other college and university flight programs.

In the event of unforeseen cost escalation, such as rapidly rising fuel costs, aircraft rental costs can be adjusted accordingly. Any proposed cost increases shall be set forth in writing and received no later than 30 days before such increases are to be put in effect.

Approved flight costs will be made an addendum to this contract.

C. Aircraft Specification and Equipment:

Modern aircraft meeting FAA specifications will be provided for flight training.

All flight instruction by the CONTRACTOR for ISU students in the Department of Aerospace Technology will be in an aircraft owned and/or operated by said CONTRACTOR.

II. PAYMENT FOR INN:

Flight instruction paid in advance to the CONTRACTOR. Flight fees normally will be be did not the number of hours of flying in the course undertaken. To the CONTRACTOR, students may pay for flight costs in advangmaller increment basis directly to the CONTRACTOR.

The UNIVERIOR be responsible for student flight fees.

III. CONTRACTUAL

The term of ict shall be for a period of one academic year, renewable from yeanless written notice to terminate is given within thirty (30) days of the cn by either of the said parties. The term of this agreement is from July, 1990, to 30th day of June, 1991.

IV. TERMINATION:

The UNIVER ves the right to terminate this contract upon serving written notice to FRACTOR thirty (30) days prior to the date of termination or immstudents' safety is, in the opinion of the UNIVERSITY, endangered.

The CONTR serves the right to terminate this contract upon serving written notice to VERSITY thirty (30) days prior to the date of termination. The CTOR agrees to complete students enrolled in flight courses for that sewhich the contract is terminated.

In consideration for the mutual undertaking covered by this contract, the UNIVERSITY has designated the CONTRACTOR as one of the UNIVERSITY'S recognized flight training schools. The UNIVERSITY will make known to all of the students in its flight training courses the names, locations, and prices of each of the recognized flight training schools.

V. <u>ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS</u>:

The parties hereto incorporate herein as part and parcel of this contract, the "Indiana State University Contractor Flight Handbook" (Revised 3/89) which is attached to and made a part of this contract.

CONTRACTOR FLIGHT HANDBOOK

The purpose of this handbook is to make available to the Contractor the specific rules and procedures that the University feels necessary to guarantee a quality educational program. Contractor will use controlled airports as much as possible for takeoff and landing practice, emergency procedures, single engine demonstrations. The contractor will not deviate from those procedures unless specifically allowed by the University.

I. Type of Training:

- A. Said training shall in general be of the type and quality approved by the Federal Aviation Administration and as approved and specified by the Contract document, the University Bulletin, and published Aerospace Department syllabi.
- B. All flights shall be conducted in accordance with local and FAA regulations. Any student using the aircraft in any other manner is subject to dismissal without recourse.
 - Individuals so dismissed will be immediately grounded by the Contractor's Chief Flight Instructor and the University's Chairman of the Department of Aerospace Technology and will remain grounded until the results of an inquiry chaired by the University administration is made known.
- C. Training shall be of a quality level to meet or exceed the requirements of FAR Part 61 and University curricula.
- D. Training will be conducted by the use of an original equipment manufacturer's standardized syllabus and all required progress checks will be conducted as specified in the appropriate syllabus.

II. <u>Performance and Operation of Equipment:</u>

- A. The Contractor shall provide equipment in sufficient quantity and quality to meet the requirements of the University calendar. The Contractor shall in no event be liable to the University or to the University's student for reasonable failure or delay in furnishing said training where such failure or delay is occasioned by breakdown or repair of equipment, or by causes beyond the Contractor's control.
- B. The Contractor reserves the right to determine the manner in which its equipment shall be operated, and the University agrees that it will advise all of its students that they shall observe and obey all orders which may be given by Contractor's instructors during the training period.
- C. The Contractor further agrees to furnish equipment of quantity and type as specified by FAR Part 61 and/or FAR Part 91 for the appropriate courses.
- D. Students will be provided an aircraft "ready for flight" and available at their scheduled times for instruction.

- E. Radio service will be a activated at all times when a student flight is taxiing or engaged in actual fligh
- F. Runway, taxiway, and lighting will meet FAA standards.
- G. Only authorized and demaintenance officials may release an aircraft from maintenance to the flig
- H. An aircraft when relea_{aintenance}, will be inspected by a flight instructor and such inspection recorde_{leasing} the aircraft to student use.
- I. If an instructor grounds it may not be reassigned until inspected and signed out by an appropriate maincial.
- J. A daily status report of on of the aircraft will be maintained.
- K. An aircraft maintenance han the one required for the FAA will be maintained showing disposition of alce orders.
- L. A suitable log shall be lan accessible place for the student to enter minor or major complaints or obsincerning the aircraft's condition. This sheet shall be available for inspection bersity and student at all times.
- M. If a student refuses to flybecause of the condition of the aircraft, an inspection will be made by the instructor may assign that aircraft to another student if he finds the aircraft to_{1y}.
- N. In the event that a studged period must be cancelled by the Contractor, the student shall be notified ellation by telephone where such cancellations occur more than one hour befont's scheduled flight time.
- O. If a student, for any reasolto meet a scheduled flight training period, the student will notify the Contractor facticable (no later than four hours prior to the flight) stating the reason(s) for thon and reschedule the lesson. Failure to do so shall be grounds for disciplination by the Contractor and/or the University per published Aerospace Depacies and procedures.

III. Instructional:

- A. The Contractor agrees to fuate office space, oral instruction rooms, lounges, and restrooms adequately furnident use.
- B. The Contractor shall provideurrent training materials (i.e. charts, approach plates, NOTAMs, etc.) to ensure sens under all weather conditions. It is imperative that students train under condit prepare them for flight using current and correct information.
- C. The Contractor will not stars instruction until an authorization ("Green Sheet") has been received from the Department.

- D. Ground instruction will be conducted as necessary to promote safety and successful accomplishment of training and in the amount designated by FAR Part 61 and University curricula. The primary responsibility for ground instruction rests with Indiana State University. The Contractor agrees to accept University ground instruction as an integral part of the syllabus for any FAA certificate. The University will recommend qualified students for FAA written examinations for which ground instruction was given.
- E. Flight instruction will be provided by the Contractor in the amount designated by FAR Part 61 and/or University curricula. Flight time prescribed for a course of instruction should be used as a guide as to when the "average" student should be examined and graded. If the student does not complete the course within five flight hours over the prescribed time, the Contractor will return the student to the Aerospace Department for evaluation and disposition. Safety is paramount, and no student should be pressured into flying beyond his/her capabilities.
- F. In the event that a student fails to report for a flight training period, the Contractor has authority to remove the student from the schedule until appropriate investigation and counseling has taken place. In the event a student "no-shows" two or more times during a given semester, the Contractor may charge the student an amount equal to one hour of ground instruction at the prevailing rate listed in the negotiated flight fees section addendum to the contract. All such charges will be reported in writing to the Department of Aerospace Technology.
- G. If a student falls behind his/her flight training schedule, the Contractor shall notify the University of the problem and if the condition was caused through no fault of the student, the Contractor shall see that an instructor and aircraft are available for special make-up sessions. The student will be required to attend these special make-up sessions.
- H. An instructor will be on duty at the aviation facility whenever students are scheduled for flight.
- I. The Contractor or his agent shall confirm that appropriate medical certificates, pilot certificates, releases, and prerequisites necessary for the satisfactory completion of the flight lesson are evident.
- J. Instructors assigned to the ISU flight instruction programs will not be scheduled for any other flight operations during the hours ISU student flying is scheduled.
- K. Flight simulators (ground trainers) will be provided by the University to meet course needs. The Contractor shall recognize and incorporate the use of the simulators in the curriculum.
- L. Students who propose to fly with flight schools other than ISU Contractors during the year must have approval of such flight training signed by the Aerospace Department Chairman, and on file with the Department prior to initiating such flight activity. The minimum flight time to be flown at the Flight Contractor for any certificate or rating will be found in the Aerospace Flight Student Information Handbook. In the event a student does not secure approval prior to the flight time, the flight time acquired at a non-contract location may be considered null and void toward fulfilling FAA minimum experience requirements by either Contractor or the Aerospace Department.

IV. Records and Reports:

The following records are required of Contractors and furnished to the University:

- 1. Student injury Any injury requiring medical attention involving ISU students will be reported immediately by telephone to the chairperson of Aerospace Technology.
- 2. Accident and Incident Reports.
 - a. All accidents or incidents in any way involving ISU students will be reported immediately by telephone followed by a written report within two weeks of the accident or incident. The written report will be treated in a confidential manner and will be used by the University in its continuous evaluation program to improve training and safety.
 - b. Accidents are defined as: Those occurrences where an aircraft in use by Indiana State University, its students or representatives, is damaged or damages another aircraft requiring it to be grounded for any period of time; or; damages to a vehicle or structure causing it to require repair; or; injury to or caused by a student or representative of ISU.
 - c. Incidents are defined as any occurrence of a lesser nature than accident or potential occurrence which might have led to an accident. Examples of incidents in the air or on the ground: a near miss, poor judgment, unsafe practices or techniques, engine failure, etc.
- 3. "No-show" report -- On Friday, so as to be available in the Department of Aerospace Technology on Monday morning.
- 4. Student progress -- at regular reporting periods.
- 5. Report of student difficulties -- when occurring or five hours over prescribed flight time for course.
- 6. Discipline and infraction of rules -- when occurring.
- 7. Aircraft utilization -- on request.
- 8. Aircraft condition -- on request.
- 9. Aircraft grounded -- on request.
- 10. Instructor load performance -- on request.
- 11. Student financial records -- summary for each semester or session (as applicable) -- on request.
- 12. Instructor Assignment -- submitted within two weeks of the start of the semester and listing students assigned to each instructor. The Aerospace Department will be advised of any subsequent changes of instructors.

V. Record Keeping:

Contractor agrees to furnish facilities and personnel for accurate records keeping and to comply with the request of the University for submission of records in support of flight training.

The University will provide course outlines, lesson plans, and hour-by hour syllabi for each flight course offered under contract and such outlines, lesson plans, and hour-by-hour syllabi shall be incorporated by the parties involved as a parcel of this handbook. Records of course progress, completion, and grades shall be maintained by the Contractor on a student record folder as developed by the aviation education firm of Jeppeson Sanderson, Inc., or a reasonable facsimile thereof. This folder will be submitted with the final flight evaluation form. If a student is unable to complete the flight course syllabus within the allotted semester in which he/she is enrolled and received an incomplete grade, the Contractor will report to the Aerospace Department within three (3) days of the students' completion of the flight course requirements.

VI. Training Schedule and Administration of Courses:

The parties agree to confer concerning the scheduling of flight training in order to arrange a schedule mutually agreeable to all parties.

The Contractor shall provide written evidence of in-service training for his flight instructors to assure quality and uniformity of flight instruction furnished under this contract. Such training may be in the form of seminars, planned group instruction, and/or individual instruction. Group training must be scheduled at least two times per semester. The Contractor shall invite the Aerospace Department to attend these training sessions, thus providing a vehicle for direct communication between faculty of the Aerospace Department and the Contractor.

Each Contractor has the responsibility of providing the appropriate FAA Examiner at the time and place the student needs at no cost to the University.

The parties agree that the University shall have access to the premises of the Contractor to confer as to the quality of instruction. Such access shall include student records and special student evaluation flights.

It is understood and agreed that employees of the Contractor shall in no event become employees or servants of the University while performing functions meeting the needs and requirements of this contract.

VII. Right to Reject Trainees:

The Contractor shall recommend to the University the disenrollment of a particular student from training for reasons of failure to demonstrate competency in any phase of training or for reasons of failure to conform to regulations duly published for compliance in regard to training or operation of aircraft.

VIII. Flight Personnel:

A. The University agrees that it will furnish a Chairman, Department of Aerospace Technology, who will be responsible for coordination of all phases of the flight program contracted herein through the use of Flight Program Coordinators.

- B. Each Contractor will name a Chief Flight Instructor who will coordinate flight training.
- C. The Contractor agrees that its flight instructors will:
 - 1. Hold a currently valid Federal Aviation Administration Flight Instructor Certificate for Airplane and/or Instrument as required for the appropriate course meeting standards of FAR Part 61.
 - 2. Be of adequate experience, knowledge, ability, and moral character.
 - 3. Have a good safety record verifiable by the Federal Aviation Administration.

IX. Release of Liability:

The Contractor hereby releases the University, its officers, agents, servants, and employees from any and all claims and liabilities of any type whatsoever or damage to, loss of, or destruction of any property of the Contractor, its officers, agents, servants, and employees, and the property of any person, firm, corporation, or other party, and for the injury to or death of any person, firm, corporation, or other party, and for injury to or death of Contractor's officers, agents, servants, and employees, and for injury to or death of any students furnished by the University, and of any person or persons which may now or hereafter arise out of or result from or be in any way connected, directly or indirectly, with said training or the operation of the aircraft hereunder or performance of this agreement.

X. <u>Indemnify</u>:

The Contractor further agrees to indemnify and save harmless the University, its officers, agents, and employees, from and against any and all claims and liabilities of any type whatsoever and for damage to, loss of, or destruction of any property of a person (including, but not limited to, Contractor's officers, agents, servants, and employees), firm, corporation and/or other party, and for injury to or death of any person or persons (including, but not limited to, the University's students and Contractor's officers, agents, servants, and employees) which many arise out of or result from or be in any way connected, directly or indirectly, with the performance of this agreement. This indemnity agreement shall extend also to any expense incurred by the University in connection with the defense of any such claims contemplated herein.

XI. Insurance:

The Contractor agrees to provide the following insurance coverage:

A. In connection with the operation of aircraft and the performance of this contract (or the flight checking of trainees hereunder by the employees or representatives of governmental agencies), the Contractor engaged to provide the flight training shall procure and maintain at all times during the performance of service under this contract Aircraft Public Liability Insurance including coverage of liability to passengers against bodily injury and property damage. Such insurance shall be procured and maintained in limits of not less than Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) with respect to any one person injured or killed and, subject to that limit per person, an aggregate limit of Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000.00) with respect to any number of persons injured or killed as a result of any one accident, and Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) per accident with respect to property damage. The liability with respect to passenger liability shall not be less than Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) per aircraft seat available to a Three Million Dollar (\$3,000,000.00) aggregate limit. This required insurance coverage shall be

carried under the terms and conditions which shall protect the Contractor, the student trainee, and the University, its agents, servants, and employees.

- B. Each insurance policy evidencing this required insurance shall bear appropriate endorsements whereby the insurance carrier waives any rights of subrogation against the University by reason of any payment under such policy, and such policy shall further provide that the university will be given thirty (30) days prior notice before cancellation of such policy or reduction of coverage thereunder can be effective.
- C. The Contractor shall, prior to initiation of flight instruction under this contract, submit to the University or its duly authorized representative, (1) a certified copy of the insurance policy actually procured and maintained, and (2) an insurance certificate issued by the insurance carrier certifying to the existence of the required insurance coverage in conformity with this clause. This insurance documentation shall show the period of coverage to be at least for the length of the contract period.
- D. Indiana State University, Indiana State University Foundation, Indiana State University Board of Trustees, their predecessors and successors, their agents, servants, employees, and students while acting within the scope of their duties as such, shall be among the named insured in such policies.

XII. Financial Responsibilities:

The contractor shall furnish upon request proof of financial responsibility as evidenced by financial statements made on the forms approved by the University.

The financial statement shows the condition of the Contractors business and operation that is concerned with the operation of the University flight program. Particular items to be included to be specified by the University.

AGREEMENT TO PROVIDE FLIGHT TRAINING

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this first day of July, 1990, by and between INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES, hereinafter referred to as the "UNIVERSITY", and Brown Flying School, Inc., hereinafter referred to as the "CONTRACTOR".

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, the UNIVERSITY has initiated within its School of Technology programs in Aerospace Administration, Professional Pilot Technology, and General Aviation Flight Technology which will be available to the students of Indiana State University.

WHEREAS, the CONTRACTOR owns and operates an incorporated flight school with all the necessary instructors, aircraft, and supporting facilities.

WHEREAS, the CONTRACTOR has proposed to the UNIVERSITY that it be permitted to conduct the in-flight training and participate in related cooperative education endeavors for Indiana State University students in conjunction with the UNIVERSITY'S aviation program.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained the parties agree, as follows:

I. <u>FLIGHT TRAINING:</u>

The CONTRACTOR shall provide to flight students of the UNIVERSITY the following described flight training at the place, price, quantity, and for the term indicated, subject to Terms and Conditions attached hereto and made a part hereof:

A. Type of Training:

Private Pilot Commercial Pilot Instrument Rating Flight Instructor Certificate Multi-Engine Rating Cooperative Experiences Published Course Requirements The following activities conducted in connection with the UNIVERSITY'S flight training program shall be and are considered part of the contract and shall be subject to and part of the conditions contained in said contract:

- 1. Participation in Indiana State University flight team activities
- 2. Competition in National Intercollegiate Flying Association Meets
- 3. Faculty proficiency flying

The above activities are conducted in conjunction with and subject to all terms and conditions of this contract to provide flight training for Indiana State University.

B. Hours of Training and Costs:

The minimum required hours of flight and ground instruction are governed by Federal Aviation Regulations, Part 61.

The costs for aircraft rental and flight instruction will be generally based upon the normal market price reduced by approximately fifteen percent for Indiana State University students. Specific rates will be negotiated and agreed upon annually during or before June and will be published and in effect on July 1 each year. The agreed flying costs must be competitive with other college and university flight programs.

In the event of unforeseen cost escalation, such as rapidly rising fuel costs, aircraft rental costs can be adjusted accordingly. Any proposed cost increases shall be set forth in writing and received no later than 30 days before such increases are to be put in effect.

Approved flight costs will be made an addendum to this contract.

C. <u>Aircraft Specification and Equipment:</u>

Modern aircraft meeting FAA specifications will be provided for flight training.

All flight instruction by the CONTRACTOR for ISU students in the Department of Aerospace Technology will be in an aircraft owned and/or operated by said CONTRACTOR.

II. PAYMENT FOR INSTRUCTION:

Flight instruction fees may be paid in advance to the CONTRACTOR. Flight fees normally will be paid in advance for the number of hours of flying in the course undertaken. With approval of the CONTRACTOR, students may pay for flight costs in advance or on a smaller increment basis directly to the CONTRACTOR.

The UNIVERSITY will not be responsible for student flight fees.

III. CONTRACTUAL TERMS:

The term of this contract shall be for a period of one academic year, renewable from year to year, unless written notice to terminate is given within thirty (30) days of the current term by either of the said parties. The term of this agreement is from 1st day of July, 1990, to 30th day of June, 1991.

IV. <u>TERMINATION</u>:

The UNIVERSITY reserves the right to terminate this contract upon serving written notice to the CONTRACTOR thirty (30) days prior to the date of termination or immediately if students' safety is, in the opinion of the UNIVERSITY, endangered.

The CONTRACTOR reserves the right to terminate this contract upon serving written notice to the UNIVERSITY thirty (30) days prior to the date of termination. The CONTRACTOR agrees to complete students enrolled in flight courses for that semester in which the contract is terminated.

In consideration for the mutual undertaking covered by this contract, the UNIVERSITY has designated the CONTRACTOR as one of the UNIVERSITY'S recognized flight training schools. The UNIVERSITY will make known to all of the students in its flight training courses the names, locations, and prices of each of the recognized flight training schools.

V. <u>ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS</u>:

The parties hereto incorporate herein as part and parcel of this contract, the "Indiana State University Contractor Flight Handbook" (Revised 3/89) which is attached to and made a part of this contract.

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY

CONTRACTOR FLIGHT HANDBOOK

The purpose of this handbook is to make available to the Contractor the specific rules and procedures that the University feels necessary to guarantee a quality educational program. Contractor will use controlled airports as much as possible for takeoff and landing practice, emergency procedures, single engine demonstrations. The contractor will not deviate from those procedures unless specifically allowed by the University.

I. Type of Training:

- A. Said training shall in general be of the type and quality approved by the Federal Aviation Administration and as approved and specified by the Contract document, the University Bulletin, and published Aerospace Department syllabi.
- B. All flights shall be conducted in accordance with local and FAA regulations. Any student using the aircraft in any other manner is subject to dismissal without recourse.
 - Individuals so dismissed will be immediately grounded by the Contractor's Chief Flight Instructor and the University's Chairman of the Department of Aerospace Technology and will remain grounded until the results of an inquiry chaired by the University administration is made known.
- C. Training shall be of a quality level to meet or exceed the requirements of FAR Part 61 and University curricula.
- D. Training will be conducted by the use of an original equipment manufacturer's standardized syllabus and all required progress checks will be conducted as specified in the appropriate syllabus.

II. Performance and Operation of Equipment:

- A. The Contractor shall provide equipment in sufficient quantity and quality to meet the requirements of the University calendar. The Contractor shall in no event be liable to the University or to the University's student for reasonable failure or delay in furnishing said training where such failure or delay is occasioned by breakdown or repair of equipment, or by causes beyond the Contractor's control.
- B. The Contractor reserves the right to determine the manner in which its equipment shall be operated, and the University agrees that it will advise all of its students that they shall observe and obey all orders which may be given by Contractor's instructors during the training period.

- H. An aircraft when released from maintenance, will be inspected by a flight instructor and such inspection recorded before releasing the aircraft to student use.
- I. If an instructor grounds an aircraft, it may not be reassigned until inspected and signed out by an appropriate maintenance official.
- J. A daily status report of the condition of the aircraft will be maintained.
- K. An aircraft maintenance log other than the one required for the FAA will be maintained showing disposition of all maintenance orders.
- L. A suitable log shall be provided in an accessible place for the student to enter minor or major complaints or observations concerning the aircraft's condition. This sheet shall be available for inspection by the University and student at all times.
- M. If a student refuses to fly an aircraft because of the condition of the aircraft, an inspection will be made by the instructor. The instructor may assign that aircraft to another student if he finds the aircraft to be airworthy.
- N. In the event that a student's scheduled period must be cancelled by the Contractor, the student shall be notified of the cancellation by telephone where such cancellations occur more than one hour before the student's scheduled flight time.
- O. If a student, for any reason, is unable to meet a scheduled flight training period, the student will notify the Contractor as soon as practicable (no later than four hours prior to the flight) stating the reason(s) for the cancellation and reschedule the lesson. Failure to do so shall be grounds for discipline and correction by the Contractor and/or the University per published Aerospace Department policies and procedures.

The parties agree that the University shall have access to the premises of the Contractor to confer as to the quality of instruction. Such access shall include student records and special student evaluation flights.

It is understood and agreed that employees of the Contractor shall in no event become employees or servants of the University while performing functions meeting the needs and requirements of this contract.

VII. Right to Reject Trainees:

The Contractor shall recommend to the University the disenrollment of a particular student from training for reasons of failure to demonstrate competency in any phase of training or for reasons of failure to conform to regulations duly published for compliance in regard to training or operation of aircraft.

VIII. Flight Personnel:

A. The University agrees that it will furnish a Chairman, Department of Aerospace Technology, who will be responsible for coordination of all phases of the flight program contracted herein through the use of Flight Program Coordinators.

- B. Each Contractor will name a Chief Flight Instructor who will coordinate flight training.
- C. The Contractor agrees that its flight instructors will:
 - 1. Hold a currently valid Federal Aviation Administration Flight Instructor Certificate for Airplane and/or Instrument as required for the appropriate course meeting standards of FAR Part 61.
 - 2. Be of adequate experience, knowledge, ability, and moral character.
 - 3. Have a good safety record verifiable by the Federal Aviation Administration.

IX. Release of Liability:

The Contractor hereby releases the University, its officers, agents, servants, and employees from any and all claims and liabilities of any type whatsoever or damage to, loss of, or destruction of any property of the Contractor, its officers, agents, servants, and employees, and the property of any person, firm, corporation, or other party, and for the injury to or death of any person, firm, corporation, or other party, and for injury to or death of Contractor's officers, agents, servants, and employees, and for injury to or death of any students furnished by the University, and of any person or persons which may now or hereafter arise out of or result from or be in any way connected, directly or indirectly, with said training or the operation of the aircraft hereunder or performance of this agreement.

X. Indemnify:

The Contractor further agrees to indemnify and save harmless the University, its officers, agents, and employees, from and against any and all claims and liabilities of any type whatsoever and for damage to, loss of, or destruction of any property of a person (including, but not limited to, Contractor's officers, agents, servants, and employees), firm, corporation and/or other party, and for injury to or death of any person or persons (including, but not limited to, the University's students and Contractor's officers, agents, servants, and employees) which many arise out of or result from or be in any way connected, directly or indirectly, with the performance of this agreement. This indemnity agreement shall extend also to any expense incurred by the University in connection with the defense of any such claims contemplated herein.

XI. <u>Insurance</u>:

The Contractor agrees to provide the following insurance coverage:

A. In connection with the operation of aircraft and the performance of this contract (or the flight checking of trainees hereunder by the employees or representatives of governmental agencies), the Contractor engaged to provide the flight training shall procure and maintain at all times during the performance of service under this contract Aircraft Public Liability Insurance including coverage of liability to passengers against bodily injury and property damage. Such insurance shall be procured and maintained in limits of not less than Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) with respect to any one person injured or killed and, subject to that limit per person, an aggregate limit of Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000.00) with respect to any number of persons injured or killed as a result of any one accident, and Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) per accident with respect to property damage. The liability with respect to passenger liability shall not be less than Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) per aircraft seat available to a Three Million Dollar (\$3,000,000.00) aggregate limit. This required insurance coverage shall be

carried under the terms and conditions which shall protect the Contractor, the student trainee, and the University, its agents, servants, and employees.

- B. Each insurance policy evidencing this required insurance shall bear appropriate endorsements whereby the insurance carrier waives any rights of subrogation against the University by reason of any payment under such policy, and such policy shall further provide that the university will be given thirty (30) days prior notice before cancellation of such policy or reduction of coverage thereunder can be effective.
- C. The Contractor shall, prior to initiation of flight instruction under this contract, submit to the University or its duly authorized representative, (1) a certified copy of the insurance policy actually procured and maintained, and (2) an insurance certificate issued by the insurance carrier certifying to the existence of the required insurance coverage in conformity with this clause. This insurance documentation shall show the period of coverage to be at least for the length of the contract period.
- D. Indiana State University, Indiana State University Foundation, Indiana State University Board of Trustees, their predecessors and successors, their agents, servants, employees, and students while acting within the scope of their duties as such, shall be among the named insured in such policies.

XII. Financial Responsibilities:

The contractor shall furnish upon request proof of financial responsibility as evidenced by financial statements made on the forms approved by the University.

The financial statement shows the condition of the Contractors business and operation that is concerned with the operation of the University flight program. Particular items to be included to be specified by the University.

SCHOOL OF MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

ST. FRANCIS HOSPITAL CENTER

and

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY

This document is an agreement between St. Francis Hospital Center, hereinafter referred to as the Hospital, and Indiana State University, hereinafter referred to as the University, regarding an affiliation for the purpose of training students in Medical Technology.

Section I

- St. Francis Hospital Center agrees to abide by the following provisions:
- A. <u>Technology Training</u>: The Hospital agrees to maintain a training program which will fulfill all the requirements established by the Committee on Allied Health Education and Administration and the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Science.
- B. Qualification of Applicants: The Hospital agrees to consider for training in Medical Technology those students from the University who qualify according to the criteria established by the Hospital. The Hospital can also accept qualified applicants from other properly accredited colleges or universities.
- C. Admissions: Minimum criteria for admission to St. Francis
 Hospital Center School of Medical Technology include:
 - Completion of the equivalent of a minimum of 90 semester hours (135 quarter hours) of academic credit in a college or university approved by a recognized regional accrediting agency. Prerequisite credit from the University must meet the requirements of the Hospital's School of Medical Technology.
 - 2. A student, to be qualified, shall have maintained a cumulative grade point average of not less than 2.0 (4.0 point system) and 2.0 in biology and chemistry courses taken.
 - 3. Each student applicant shall file with the Hospital a completed application, a copy of his transcript along with a listing of courses in progress, and a satisfactory transcript evaluation by designated officials.

- D. Selection of Students: The Hospital reserves the right to refuse admission to any student who does not meet established criteria. Waiver of any of the criteria must be based on mutual agreement between the Hospital and University representatives. Final selection of students will be determined by the Admissions Committee for the School of Medical Technology of St. Francis Hospital Center.
- E. <u>Progress Reports</u>: The Hospital agrees to furnish the University with a final grade for each course taken by the student, and at midterm to give the University a report of satisfactory or unsatisfactory progress for each student.
- F. <u>Dismissal</u>: If, at midterm of the program, the student fails to meet the required standards of performance and competency for hospital work, the Hospital will notify the University and representatives of both institutions will meet with the student. If, after meeting with the student, it is the opinion of both the University and Hospital representatives that it is advisable, the student will be disenrolled from the Hospital training program.
- G. Provision for Liaison: The Hospital will designate a person as a liaison between the Hospital and the University without remuneration, to facilitate improved communications and better coordination of efforts of the two institutions in accomplishing mutual objectives.
- H. <u>Injuries</u>: Students will be given immediate first-aid and medical treatment by the Hospital for any injury sustained during the conduct of the student's performance.

Section II

The University agrees to abide by the following provisions:

A. <u>Didactic Instruction</u>: The University shall offer an approved didactic course of study appropriate for students in a Medical Technology Program in accordance with requirements established by the Committee on Allied Health Education and Administration and the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Science. The course of studies shall be published each year in the University Catalog.

B. <u>Credit</u>: The University will grant 34 semester hours of credit for successful completion of the Hospital program. The credit granted for each segment of the Hospital program will be distributed as follows:

- C. <u>Degree</u>: The University will grant a baccalaureate degree to eligible students who successfully complete the Medical Technology Program at the Hospital. Credit hours and corresponding grades issued from the clinical program shall be made part of the official transcript awarded to the student upon completion of his degree requirements. Granting of the degree shall not be contingent upon the student passing a certification or licensure examination offered by any of the recognized certification agencies.
- D. <u>Liaison Appointment</u>: The University shall designate a person to act as a liaison between the University and the Hospital, without remuneration to facilitate improved communications and better coordination of efforts of the two institutions in accomplishing mutual objectives.
- E. <u>Academic Appointments</u>: Academic appointments for the Director and Program Director will be provided by the University without remuneration.
- F. <u>Student Activities</u>: Medical Technology students will be accorded the same privileges available to other students in similar academic settings.

Section III

- St. Francis Hospital Center, and the University mutually agree that:
- A. <u>Joint Committee</u>: Representatives of the Medical Technology Program from each institution shall comprise a joint committee which shall meet at least once each year to review the progress of the program, develop policy for the following year, and discuss curriculum.
 - 1. Hospital representatives shall be:
 - Director of the School of Medical Technology, or designated representative,
 - b.) Associate Administrator or designated representative.
 - .2. University representatives shall be:
 - a.) Dean of Academic Affairs, or designated representative,
 - b.) Counselor of Pre-Medical Technology Training Program.
- B. <u>Educational Policies</u>: Development of specific educational policies not provided for in this agreement shall be the responsibility of the Joint Committee.
- C. <u>Professional Conduct</u>: Appropriate ethical and professional conduct shall be required of all students.
- D. Fees and Tuition: Students will pay a fee per credit hour for courses in the amount approved by the trustees of the University. From the amount paid to the University, the University will remit to the Hospital 75% of the fees collected in consideration of the Hospital provision of:
 - 1. Instruction and Administration
 - 2. Facilities and Equipment

Fees and Tuition: Students not bound by the above clause will be required to pay tuition to the Hospital in the amount approved by the administrators of the Hospital's School of Medical Technology. The hospital rate shall be subject to annual review and may be increased or decreased by an amendment to this agreement signed by an authorized official of the parties hereto. The hospital rate shall be in consideration of the instruction, administration, facilities, supervision and equipment provided by the Hospital.

E. <u>Publications</u>: St. Francis Hospital Center agrees to recognize the University as an affiliated institution in its publications, and the University shall make similar identification of the Hospital School in its literature.

F. Insurance:

1. Liability: The student will purchase his or her own liability insurance coverage in accordance with hospital policy.

Each party releases the other of any liability as a result of any acts of its agents, servants, employees, officers and students occurring out of operation of this program for any injury or damage sustained by it or any person in privity therewith.

- 2. Health: The student will provide his or her own medical and hospital insurance coverage while *in the program.
- G. Terms of Agreement: This agreement shall continue in force beginning on the latest date of the signatures appended hereto. Provisions of this agreement will be renewed by appropriate representatives of the University and the Hospital each year thereafter. Each party hereto may terminate this agreement by at least one (1) calendar year's written notice to the other party. All students enrolled in the program at the time of that notice to terminate this agreement shall be permitted to complete the clinical laboratory practice needed for graduation subject to the terms and conditions herein.
- H. <u>Changes and Revisions</u>: Revisions or changes to any part of this agreement must involve the official representatives of the Hospital and the University.

This agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto and their successors.

SECTION I

I. AGREEMENTS

International Business Machines

Indiana State University and the International Business Machines Corporation have negotiated a Jointly Defined Effort to develop multimedia materials suitable for use in demonstration of multimedia capability of IBM equipment. In return for the University's development of materials, IBM will donate certain computer equipment to the University. A copy of the agreement is presented in Exhibit D. University counsel assisted with the development of the agreement.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approval of the Jointly Defined Effort with International Business Machines as presented in Exhibit D.

Anchor Land Development, Inc.

Anchor Land Development, Inc. owns and is about to excavate land in Dearborn County, Indiana, but wishes to first determine whether there are any items of archaeological significance on the premises. Accordingly, Anchor proposes to contract with the University through its Anthropology Laboratory to excavate amd recover human remains on site. Anchor will pay the University an amount not to exceed \$102,549 for the services rendered. A copy of the agreement, as developed by University counsel, is presented in Exhibit E.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approval of the agreement as contained in Exhibit E.

Zenith Data Systems

An agreement with Zenith Data Systems has been reached under which the University Computer Center will be authorized to perform certain maintenance and repair functions on University owned Zenith equipment as an authorized Zenith service center. Locally available repair and maintenance sevice is not adequate at the present time. The agreement is presented in Exhibit F.

Vigo County Parks and Recreation Department

The Vigo County Parks and Recreation Department is continuing with the development of the pioneer village at Fowler Park located in southern Vigo County. As part of that development, a reproduction of a grist mill has been included. The ISU School of Technology has contracted to do the design, engineering and fabrication of the six wooden gears for the mill under an agreement presented in Exhibit G. University counsel developed an agreement in consultation with the School of Technology and the Parks and Recreation Department.

Recommendation: Approval of the agreement presented in Exhibit G.

Student Teacher, Placement Standard Agreement

A standard agreement form for the placement of student teachers and other student participants in school corporations for practicum experiences is presented in Exhibit H. University Counsel has reviewed the form with the School of Education.

K. 1990-91 LIABILITY AND PROPERTY INSURANCE COVERAGES

Periodically the University prepares specifications for liability and property insurance proposals to test market conditions. After an agent or underwriter has been selected, annual renewals are solicited from letters of record of the agent or the underwriters. These renewals are based on market conditions, CPI indexes, account performance, and coverage adjustments.

For the 1990-91 renewal year the University utilized the consulting firm of Alderson Risk Management, Inc. Seven bids were received representing 25 independent insurance companies. Based on the review of the proposals received and the recommendation of the Alderson Risk Management firm the following liability and property insurance coverages have been made effective on the October/November 1990 renewal dates:

L. GROUP HEALTH BENEFITS PROGRAM

The University Health Benefits coverage currently administered under contract with Acordia Collegiate Benefits, Inc. expired on November 30, 1990. An

extension of the contract through December 31, 1990, was requested. Effective January 1, 1991, the contract period will be on a calendar year basis.

A University-wide Health Benefits Review Committee was appointed and has been meeting during the fall semester. Recommendations were forwarded to University faculty government and the Office Personnel Council. Suggested adjustments in coverage and new contribution rates have been endorsed by each of these groups, as recommended by the administration, to become effective January 1, 1991.

Wellness care will be implemented and will extend coverage for routine physicals and related tests up to a maximum benefit payment of \$250 per covered individual per calendar year, subject to the major medical deductible and coinsurance. (See Exhibit I).

Certain chiropractic charges will be covered under outpatient physical therapy which will have a \$2,500 calendar year maximum benefit. The 20 visit limit for spinal manipulations has been eliminated.

Renewal of the contract with Acordia Collegiate Benefits, Inc., is recommended. Reimbursement for paid claims will be on a weekly basis with a stop loss provision of \$175,000 per membership per calendar year and managed care provisions. A per capita monthly fee of \$10.50 per membership unit will be charged for administration of the program.

Participation in the Preferred Care of Indiana network will be continued and total PCI savings will revert to the University. An incentive refund of \$100 will be made to individuals using network hospital providers.

Organ transplant coverage is covered under a separate contract with Equicor (CIGNA). The monthly rate per membership unit was \$1.30. Effective December 1, 1990, the rate has been increased to \$2.05 per membership unit.

Medical cost increases in the range of 18-23 percent are projected for 1991. Based on ISU claims experience for the current year and continuation of the changes made last year, it is projected that a 16 percent increase in contributions by the individual and the University will be necessary for 1991. Present and proposed monthly fees are as follows:

M. UNIVERSITY DAY CARE CENTER

Child Care Center fees were established by Board action in September, 1988. Fees are based on household income. Currently the minimum fee for full-time care is \$30.00 per week. To adjust for locally charged rates and to more adequately cover budgetary requirements, it is recommended that the minimum fee for full-time child care be increased to \$35 per week effective January 15, 1991. All other weekly rates remain the same.

Recommendation: Approval of the \$35.00 per week minimum fee for full-time child care effective January 15, 1991.

This letter sets forth the Agreement between Indiana State University (UNIVERSITY) and the International Business Machines Corporation (IBM) relating to a Jointly Defined Effort to develop multimedia materials suitable for IBM to use to demonstrate multimedia capability in conjunction with IBM equipment. The UNIVERSITY will gain further knowledge concerning the subject matter of this Jointly Defined Effort. The parties agree as follows:

1. SCOPE OF WORK

The scope of work, including the Jointly Defined Effort objectives, tasks to be performed, responsibilities of each party, Work Products, schedule, and personnel requirements, is set forth in Appendix 1 hereto which forms a part of this Agreement.

2. COMPENSATION

As compensation, in anticipation of UNIVERSITY successfully completing the Scope of Work as set forth in Appendix 1 of this Agreement, the equipment listed in Appendix 2 will be provided to UNIVERSITY with charges waived, and UNIVERSITY will have license(s) to use the Licensed Programs listed in Appendix 3 with charges waived.

IBM shall reimburse UNIVERSITY travelers for all reasonable travel and living expenses authorized in advance by IBM and incurred in connection with this Agreement. It is understood that reimbursements for travel and living expenses shall be in accordance with UNIVERSITY policy in amounts which are no greater than those received by IBM employees performing comparable services on behalf of IBM.

IBM shall reimburse UNIVERSITY for the enrollment fee for ene $\pm\omega$ ω person^s to attend IBM's Audio Visual Connection class in Atlanta, GA, as well as the travel and living expenses incurred for one person to attend this class, in accordance

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with the travel reimbursement policies stated above.

In addition, IBM shall reimburse UNIVERSITY for actual equipment shipping expenses authorized in advance by IBM and incurred in connection with this Agreement.

3. INFORMATION TRANSFERS

3.1 All information supplied by either party shall be nonconfidential except that any information supplied by IBM, including but not limited to program specifications, program performances, equipment performances, and methods of equipment interconnection, which is considered confidential by IBM and is so designated at the time of disclosure and reduced to writing at the time of disclosure or within twenty (20) days after it is supplied to UNIVERSITY, shall be IBM "Confidential Information"; and shall, subject to the provisions of Paragraphs 3.2 and 3.4 herein, be treated by UNIVERSITY in accordance with paragraph 3.3 for a period ending two (2) years after the date of termination or expiration of this Agreement, whichever first occurs.

UNIVERSITY understands that IBM does not wish to receive any information which may be considered confidential and/or proprietary to UNIVERSITY and/or to any one or more third parties. It is understood that any information received by IBM will not be of a confidential nature nor will it establish a confidential relationship of any kind.

- 3.2 All disclosures of IBM Confidential Information shall be made by, or under the supervision of, IBM's Managing Coordinator to UNIVERSITY's Managing Coordinator or his or her designee.
- 3.3 During the period or periods specified in Paragraph 3.1, the sole obligation of UNIVERSITY shall be to use the same care and discretion to avoid disclosure, publication, or dissemination of IBM's Confidential Information as UNIVERSITY uses with respect to similar information of its own which it does not desire to have disclosed, published, or disseminated. UNIVERSITY shall have the right to use, for its internal purposes, IBM's Confidential Information, but such right shall not include the right to disclose, publish, or disseminate such Confidential Information during the period of confidentiality.
- 3.4 The obligations imposed in this Section 3 shall not apply to any information that is already in the possession of, or is independently developed by, UNIVERSITY, or is or becomes publicly available other than through breach of the obligations in this Section 3, or is received by UNIVERSITY from a third party without either knowledge of origination in IBM or obligation of confidence, or is released for disclosure by IBM with its written consent.

4. INVENTIONS/INVENTION RIGHTS

- 4.1 "Invention" shall mean any idea, design, concept, technique, invention, discovery, or improvement, whether or not patentable, conceived and/or reduced to practice by one or more employees/students of UNIVERSITY during the term of, and in the performance of services under, this Agreement. To the extent not done so in any written report, the UNIVERSITY shall promptly make a complete written disclosure to IBM of each Invention specifically pointing out the features or concepts which are believed to be new or different.
- 4.2 Each such Invention shall be the property of UNIVERSITY, subject to a license hereby granted to IBM under such Invention, patent applications filed therefor, and any patent issuing thereon. Such license is worldwide, irrevocable, nonexclusive, nontransferable, and fully paid-up and shall include the right to make, have made, use, have used, lease, sell, and/or otherwise transfer any product and to practice and have practiced any method. Such license shall include the right of IBM to grant revocable or irrevocable sublicenses to its Subsidiaries, such sublicenses to include the right of the sublicensed Subsidiaries correspondingly to sublicense other Subsidiaries.
- 4.3 IBM shall not be liable for any payments to employees/students of, or others whose services are utilized hereunder by, UNIVERSITY who conceive or reduce to practice Inventions.
- 4.4 In the case of filing a patent application on any Invention, UNIVERSITY shall, within six (6) months of the U.S. filing date, provide to IBM an abstract of the disclosure and the serial number of each U.S. application filed.

5. RIGHTS IN DATA

- 5.1 All right, title, and interest in the intellectual property in the Work Products, as set forth in Appendix 1 hereof and submitted to IBM pursuant to this Agreement, including ownership of copyright in such materials shall vest exclusively in UNIVERSITY. UNIVERSITY shall have the right to obtain and hold in its own name copyrights, registrations, or such similar protection as may be available.
- UNIVERSITY shall promptly provide to IBM copies of said Work Products, which copies shall belong to IBM.
 UNIVERSITY hereby grants to IBM, its successors and assigns, a worldwide, nonexclusive, irrevocable, paid up right and license to use, execute, reproduce, perform, display and distribute (internally and externally) the

Work Products. Such right and license shall include the right of IBM to demonstrate the Work Products to potential users and customers of IBM products and technology.

The foregoing grant of rights and licenses with respect to Work Products includes a grant of all such rights and licenses in and to pictorial, graphic or audio/visual works, including icons, screens, music and characters, created as a result of use of the Work Products.

- 5.3 The right and license granted above shall include the right of IBM to license, sublicense and authorize IBM Subsidiaries and Distributors, and each licensed IBM Subsidiary and Distributor shall have the right correspondingly to license other IBM Subsidiaries and Distributors. For purposes of this Agreement, "Distributors" shall mean persons used by IBM and/or IBM Subsidiaries to market and/or distribute and/or demonstrate IBM products, and includes, but is not limited to, IBM's dealers, distributors and agents.
- 5.4 To the extent that any preexisting materials are incorporated into the Work Products, concurrently with the delivery of IBM's copies of each Work Product incorporating such preeexisting materials, UNIVERSITY shall identify to IBM in writing such materials, the source from which they were obtained, the owners of the materials, and the parties from whom the right and license to incorporate the materials was obtained. UNIVERSITY shall acquire sufficient rights and licenses with respect to such preexisting materials to grant to IBM the rights and licenses herein. UNIVERSITY shall have sole responsibility for acquiring fully paid up rights and licenses, and IBM shall have no obligation to pay or account for royalties or any other charges of an on-going nature with respect to such preexisting materials.

A form suitable for providing the above information is included with this Agreement as $Attachment\ A$.

- 5.5 All Work Products shall be marked by UNIVERSITY with such copyright, trademark and other intellectual property markings and attribution as are required to protect UNIVERSITY's rights and to comply with UNIVERSITY's obligations with respect to the Work Products. IBM shall reproduce such markings and attributions without alteration on all copies of Work Products that IBM makes. IBM shall have no obligation to enforce any intellectual property rights or obligations UNIVERSITY has with respect to the Work Products. Materials supplied to IBM in machine-readable form shall have such markings and attributions incorporated into the material so that it displays to users or viewers at the commencement of use of the Work Product.
- 6. PUBLICATION

In recognition that UNIVERSITY may wish to publish information relating to this Jointly Defined Effort and that IBM has an interest in the contents of such publications, UNIVERSITY will furnish copies of planned publications to IBM for review and comment prior to publication. IBM will have thirty (30) days to submit written comments to UNIVERSITY, and UNIVERSITY agrees to take such comments into consideration in preparing the final drafts of the publications.

7. REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES

- 7.1 UNIVERSITY represents and warrants: (a) the originality of any Work Product prepared hereunder; (b) that UNIVERSITY has all necessary right, title and interest (including those necessary rights to grant the licenses and rights granted herein) to the Work Products and/or related written materials supplied under this Agreement; and (c) that the Work Products and related materials do not infringe any copyright, patent, trademark, trade name, product name, trade secret or any other intellectual property right or privacy or similar right of any third party.
- 7.2 With respect to any preexisting material incorporated into the Work Product or otherwise supplied to IBM hereunder, UNIVERSITY represents and warrants that there are no license fees, royalties, or other charges of an on-going nature due.
- 7.3 UNIVERSITY represents and warrants that it is under no obligation or restriction nor will it assume any obligation or restriction which would in any way interfere with or be inconsistent with the provisions of this Agreement.
- 7.4 UNIVERSITY represents that it has or will obtain, prior to the commencement of this Jointly Defined Effort, appropriate agreements with its employees/students or others whose services it may require in the performance of this Jointly Defined Effort sufficient to enable it to comply with all of the terms of this Agreement.
- 7.5 ANY INFORMATION, MATERIALS, OR SERVICES FURNISHED BY IBM PURSUANT TO THIS AGREEMENT ARE ON AN "AS IS" BASIS. OTHER THAN WARRANTIES EXPRESSLY PROVIDED IN ITS STANDARD EQUIPMENT AND/OR LICENSED PROGRAM AGREEMENTS WHICH MAY BE ENTERED INTO AS A RESULT OF THIS AGREEMENT, IBM MAKES NO WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO THE IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY AND FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE AS TO THE DOCUMENTATION, FUNCTION, OR PERFORMANCE OF SUCH INFORMATION, MATERIALS, OR SERVICES.

8. TERM AND TERMINATION

 subject to termination by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party. It is understood that the obligations with respect to Sections 3 (INFORMATION TRANSFERS), 4 (INVENTIONS/INVENTION RIGHTS), 5 (RIGHTS IN DATA), 6 (PUBLICATION), 7 (REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES), 8 (TERM AND TERMINATION), and 11 (GENERAL PROVISIONS) herein shall survive any completion, expiration, or other termination of this Agreement until such obligations expire according to their terms and shall bind the parties, Subsidiaries of the parties, and their legal representatives, survivors, and assigns.

- 8.2 In the event of termination or expiration of this Agreement, whichever first occurs, UNIVERSITY shall return to IBM all materials which contain IBM Confidential Information, including but not limited to drawings, blueprints, descriptions, papers, and documents. UNIVERSITY shall also turn over IBM's copies of the Work Products of the tasks performed under this Agreement to IBM in their "as is" condition at the time of such termination or expiration.
- 8.3 In the event of and within thirty (30) days after termination, UNIVERSITY will prepare a final quarterly report on the Jointly Defined Effort results as set forth in Appendix 1 of this Agreement.
- 9. IBM FURNISHED IBM EQUIPMENT

For the purposes of this Agreement, IBM will provide the equipment listed in Appendix 2 and/or substitute equipment as provided below (hereinafter called "Equipment") under the terms and conditions of the applicable IBM standard agreement except as otherwise provided in this Agreement. The Equipment will be made available to UNIVERSITY subject to the following additional conditions:

- a. During the term of this Agreement, UNIVERSITY agrees that the Equipment will be used primarily for the purposes of this Agreement.
- b. UNIVERSITY will provide adequate space, power, power outlets, and incidental facilities to support the installation and operation of the Equipment.
- c. IBM may, at its option, prior to shipment of the Equipment, substitute IBM announced Equipment of comparable function needed to carry out the Scope of Work of this Agreement. Any such Equipment substitution shall be identified by IBM in writing to UNIVERSITY and such written notification shall constitute an amendment to Appendix 2 of this Agreement.

10. IBM FURNISHED LICENSED PROGRAMS

For the purposes of this Agreement, IBM will provide the Licensed Programs listed in Appendix 3 and/or substitute programs as provided below including any licensed optional materials (hereinafter called "Licensed Programs").

Licensed Programs will be provided under the terms and conditions of the IBM or vendor license agreement contained in each program package, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement.

Such Licensed Programs will be made available to UNIVERSITY subject to the following additional conditions:

- a. During the term of this Agreement, UNIVERSITY agrees that the Licensed Programs shall be used primarily for the purposes of this Agreement.
- b. IBM may, at its option, prior to shipment, substitute IBM announced Licensed Programs or vendor programs of comparable function needed to carry out the Scope of Work of this Agreement. Further, IBM may from time to time add to the list in Appendix 3 or replace items in the list as necessary to support UNIVERSITY'S participation in this program. Replaced items will be returned to IBM. Any such Licensed Program substitution, replacement, or addition shall be identified by IBM in writing to UNIVERSITY, and such written notification shall constitute an amendment to Appendix 3 of this Agreement.

11. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 11.1 "Subsidiary" shall mean a corporation, company, or other entity: (1) more than fifty percent (50%) of whose outstanding shares or securities (representing the right to vote for the election of directors or other managing authority) are, or (2) which does not have outstanding shares or securities, as may be the case in a partnership, joint venture, or unincorporated association, but more than fifty percent (50%) of the ownership interest representing the right to make decisions for such corporation, company, or other entity is; now or hereafter, owned or controlled, directly or indirectly, by a party hereto, but such corporation, company, or other entity shall be deemed to be a Subsidiary only so long as such ownership or control exists.
- 11.2 This Agreement shall not prevent either party or its
 Subsidiaries from entering into similar agreements with
 other companies in the same industry or other industries or
 with other universities, governmental, or nonprofit
 organizations or from independently developing materials,
 products, or services irrespective of their similarity to
 materials, products, or services which might result from
 this Jointly Defined Effort.

- 11.3 Unless expressly provided herein, UNIVERSITY shall not delegate or subcontract any obligation hereunder without the prior written consent of IBM.
- 11.4 Both parties shall make every reasonable effort not to publish or otherwise disclose the terms or conditions of this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other party for a period of two (2) years after expiration or termination of this Agreement, whichever first occurs, unless such disclosure is required by law, provided that the disclosing party promptly notifies the other party of the requirement to disclose before making such disclosure, or necessary to establish its rights or comply with the terms set forth herein.
- 11.5 The employees/students of UNIVERSITY shall not for any purpose be considered employees or agents of IBM. UNIVERSITY assumes full responsibility for the actions of its employees/students while performing services pursuant to this Agreement and shall be solely responsible for their supervision, daily direction and control, and payment of salary.
- 11.6 This Agreement shall not be binding upon the parties until it has been signed below by or on behalf of each party. Unless expressly provided herein, no amendment or modification shall be valid or binding upon the parties unless made in writing and signed as aforesaid. In the event of conflict between the terms and conditions of this Agreement and the terms and conditions of any IBM standard equipment or Licensed Program agreement entered into as a consequence of this Agreement, the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall prevail. In addition, this Agreement shall supersede all prior agreements, communications, representations, and understandings, either oral or written, between the parties respecting the subject matter of this Jointly Defined Effort and, together with its Appendices, shall constitute the sole agreement between the parties respecting the subject matter of this Jointly Defined Effort.
- 11.7 Any written communication required to be made or given to either party hereto pursuant to this Agreement shall be deemed to have been sufficiently given on the date of mailing if sent by registered certified mail, postage prepaid, and addressed as set forth below or to such other address as is designated by written notice given to the other party:

AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT, made and entered into as of the _____ day of October, 1990, by and between Anchor Land Development, Inc., and Indiana State University, acting through its Anthropology Laboratory ("Contractor").

WHEREAS, Anchor Land Development owns the property located on Laughery Creek, at the E 1/2, of Section 9, Township 4N, Range 1W, Dearborn County, Indiana; and

WHEREAS, Contractor has the facilities, technical expertise and manpower to conduct an archaeological excavation on said property in accordance with the proposal by the Contractor entitled "Mitigation Proposal for 12D74 Dearborn County, Indiana" (hereinafter such proposal referred to as the "Proposal," a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A); and

WHEREAS, Anchor Land Development desires to secure the services of the Contractor in accordance with the terms and conditions provided for herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the parties hereto hereby agree as follows:

Section I. Term.

This Agreement shall commence as of the date first written above and shall continue through June 31, 1992.

Section II. Services by Contractor.

The services to be provided by the Contractor under this Agreement are as set out in the Proposal. The Contractor is not obligated to excavate and recover any human remains discovered during the archaeological excavations. Such services shall be part of a separate agreement.

Section III. Services Furnished by Anchor Land Development.

Anchor Land Development shall provide earth moving equipment with operators, and water pumps necessary to conduct the services contained in the Proposal.

Section IV. Payments and Maximum Compensation.

Payments shall be made by Anchor Land Development to Contractor to reimburse Contractor for the actual expenses for work performed hereunder within 30 days following receipt on a monthly basis by Anchor Land Development of an invoice. Each such invoice shall show the total expenses through the end of the period covered by such invoice.

Notwithstanding anything contained in this Section IV, payments by Anchor Land Development for services rendered and expenses incurred by Contractor hereunder shall not exceed Onehundred and two thousand, five-hundred and forty-nine Dollars (\$102,549.00).

Section V. Reports and Studies.

Contractor shall supply Anchor Land Development with a draft of the final report as specified in the Proposal for approval by the Army Corps of Engineers, Louisville District, and the Indiana Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology.

After review and approval, Contractor shall supply Anchor Land Development with five copies of the Final Report.

Section VI. Assumption of Liability.

Contractor and Anchor Land Development shall each be responsible for the acts or omissions of its employees, agents, and representatives in connection with the Project.

Section VII. Governing Law.

This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with and governed by the laws of the State of Indiana.

Mitigation Proposal for 12D74 Dearborn County, Indiana

Following the Army Corps of Engineer's plan, Indiana State University Anthropology Laboratory proposes that the mitigation of site 12D74 in Dearborn County, Indiana be conducted in three stages. The first two stages will focus on the Fort Ancient occupation, and the third will consider the lower buried occupation.

Field Strategy and Methods

After the post-settlement overburden is removed by machinery, a series of 22, 2x2 m units systematically distributed within the two blocks will be excavated by shovel scraping and water screening through &" mesh. The deposits containing Fort Ancient debris are approximately 50 cm thick. This approach would provide needed stratigraphic control in these deposits before opening up larger areas to expose features. It would also provide data on the nature and stratigraphic location of features in the A horizon (i.e., Fort Ancient deposit) as well as a sample of debris. artifacts, may be recovered from the A horizon and sufficient information on stratigraphy might be obtained with fewer units, initially every other unit will be opened and the need for additional units will be evaluated in consultation with the Crops and DHPA. This will reduce sample redundancy and potentially allow greater effort to be focused on other aspects of the Fort Ancient deposits (i.e., feature excavation).

In all likelihood the A horizon contains components other than Fort Ancient (e.g., Late Woodland), therefore its potential to

provide useful information may be limited. The real potential for information is contained in features; specifically pits, the only feature type currently known to be preserved at the site. Therefore, the next step, once the 2x2 m units are completed, will be to use machinery to expose the surface where the pits and other features can be discriminated (i.e., the base of the A horizon). As needed, this surface will be shovel scraped by hand to define feature boundaries. Features will be exposed across both blocks totalling 11,550 m². The tops of all features will be photographed and mapped. Up to 100 features will be completely excavated and half of an additional 50 features will also be investigated. larger numbers of features are encountered then a stratified sample will be selected based on the types of features exposed. All feature fill excavated will be screened through in mesh, soil samples will be taken for flotation, and features will be mapped in profile, and plan view and photographed.

Finally the lower occupation will be investigated by shovel scraping and water screening 12, 2x2 m units distributed systematically within the northern block. Any sterile overburden will be removed with machinery (if appropriate) to within a prudent depth above the lower occupation. An additional 13 units will be placed in areas within the block where either higher debris densities or features are encountered in the initial 2x2 units (If it is determined a sufficiently large sample was obtained by the initial units given the nature of the occupation it may be possible to reduce the number of additional units excavated. This decision

would be made in consultation with the Corps and DHPA). The nature of the archaeological remains in this lower occupation is likely to be significantly different from the Fort Ancient occupation. The lower occupation is a zone of debris or a living surface which may not contain significant numbers of pit features likely to be present in the Fort Ancient occupation. Deposits in this zone will be water screened through \(\frac{1}{2}\)" mesh. Flotation samples will be collected from the occupation zone as well as from features. All features will be excavated unless unexpectedly large numbers are encountered. A stratified sampling strategy will be implemented if more than 30 features are exposed. If appropriate one-half of each feature will be excavated.

If human remains are encountered during the course of investigations DHPA and the Army Corps of Engineers will be informed within two working days. These remains will be stabilized in the field to provide the opportunity for an on-site inspection. In consultation with DHPA and the Corps a treatment program will be instituted to appropriately deal with the human remains.

Schedule and Personnel

Field work would commence as soon as possible after final approval of the project has been obtained by the Corps and DHPA (late September). Field work would hopefully be completed in December. The project will be conducted with a field crew of ten, a project supervisor (Michael Anslinger) and a field supervisor. C. Russell Stafford with serve as principal investigator. Most debris will be processed at a nearby temporary field lab, with analysis

and curation (if approved) at Indiana State University Anthropology Laboratory, Terre Haute.

Analysis

In the Fort Ancient component the above strategy will provide a sample of debris from the A horizon, but will most importantly expose a sufficiently large area of the occupation to provide information on spatial patterning of features. organization is of crucial importance in understanding Fort Ancient settlement and subsistence strategies and socio-political organization. It will be important to determine where this site fits into proposed Fort Ancient settlement hierarchies (a review of regional research issues important to the site can be found in the Phase II report [Stafford and Cantin 1989]).

The lower occupation is probably a more ephemeral occupation of unknown date. The above strategy of investigation should provide a sufficient sample to establish the period of occupation and the type of settlement represented. Especially important will be the recovery of small-scale floral and faunal remains which will provide information on diet.

Analyses of artifacts will focus on both stylistic and functional components of lithic and ceramic assemblages recovered from the site. Dating of the occupations will involve both standard topological identification of hafted bifaces and sherds, and radiocarbon determinations on multiple samples from each occupation. Functional analysis will center largely classification lithic of the assemblage into

technomorphological types used in the Midwest. A sample of the fauna and floral remains will be analyzed by a qualified professional in those respective fields. Analysis of community patterning at the site will be conducted to the extent possible through the spatial analysis of features, artifacts, and subsistence remains. An attempt will be made to tie the site into models of Fort Ancient proposed for the Ohio Valley.

A report will be produced which will detail the regional environmental and cultural setting, field and laboratory methods and strategies, results of analyses mentioned above, and conclusions integrating the site interpretations into regional models of Fort Ancient. The lower occupation will be treated in a similar manner, although specific research questions must await further data recovery at the site. A draft report of findings will be completed within one year of the termination of field work. Upon review and acceptance of the report by the Corps and DHPA a final report will then be completed.

1.0 Term.

2.0 Compensation.

Both parties agree to complete any necessary forms and acknowledgements as required by their respective governing bodies or by the state of Indiana to expedite the payment required hereunder.

3.0 Services and Products.

ISU will be responsible for the design, engineering, and fabrication of six (6) wooden gears for the Fowler Park Grist Mill, all as set forth in ISU's proposal submitted to DEPARTMENT on November 7, 1990. ISU will prepare the products included in the proposal pursuant to the procedure included in the proposal. Both the proposal and the procedures included therein are acknowledged and incorporated by reference herein.

DEPARTMENT acknowledges its responsibility to provide materials including lumber, bolts, glue, and miscellaneous hardware as necessary to complete the project, further acknowledging that delay in providing required materials could result in the inability of ISU to complete the project in a timely manner. Should delay by DEPARTMENT result in the inability of ISU to meet its deadline under this AGREEMENT, DEPARTMENT waives any claim it may have against ISU for such inability to meet its deadline.

Assembly and installation of the items included in this agreement are as set forth in the proposal previously submitted

to DEPARTMENT by ISU and include both off- and on-site work by ISU.

Upon completion of the project, ISU will provide DEPARTMENT two (2) sets of engineering drawings of the gears "as built". A Ryobi chain mortiser, purchased specifically for this project, will be delivered to DEPARTMENT at the same time, to become the property of DEPARTMENT.

4.0 Limitation of Warranties.

ISU provides all goods and services hereunder on an "as is" basis. OTHER THAN WARRANTIES EXPRESSLY PROVIDED BY ISU IN THIS DOCUMENT, ISU MAKES NO WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO THE IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY AND FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE OF ANY GOODS OR SERVICES PROVIDED HEREUNDER.

5.0 Complete Agreement.

This agreement, together with the proposal submitted to DEPARTMENT on November 7 and the procedures included therewith constitute the full agreement of the parties. Any other communication or purported understanding between them regarding this project is replaced by this complete agreement.

AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY AND SCHOOL CORPORATIONS CONCERNING COOPERATIVE EFFORTS INVOLVING STUDENT TEACHERS, PRACTICUM STUDENTS, AND OTHER TYPES OF PARTICIPANTS

The undersigned, ______a school corporation(herinafter referred to as the "School Corporation") and Indiana State University, a University accredited by the Training and Licensing Commission of Indiana (hereinafter referred to as the "University"), hereby, in accordance with Chapter 246, Indiana Acts 1969, as amended (a copy of which appears below) enter into the following agreement:

1. SCOPE OF THE AGREEMENT. This Agreement shall set out the responsibilities and rights of the School Corporation, of the University, and of any student enrolled at the University, such student to be assigned as a student teacher, practicum student or as an observer or participant in the School Corporation. For ease of reference, the following words shall have the following meanings:

"Student Teacher" shall mean a student enrolled at the University and assigned by it to teach in the School Corporation, as part of his/her preparation for entering the teaching profession.

"Practicum Student" shall mean a student enrolled at the University and assigned by it for a practicum in the School Corporation as part of the requirements for an endorsement or minor added to the basic license being sought.

"Participant" shall mean a University student, usually at the prestudent teaching level, assigned to the School Corporation with a less-than-full responsibility for instruction or instruction related activities. Terms such as: observer, tutor, teacher aide, teaching assistant, etc., characterize various types of participants.

"Supervising Teacher" shall mean a teacher in the School Corporation to whom the Student Teacher or Practicum Student is assigned and who directs the work or the activity of the student while he/she is in the School Corporation.

"University Supervisor" or "Subject Area Supervisor" or "Course Instructor" shall mean the University person who is in charge of the course of study or specific experience for which the University Student is assigned to the School Corporation.

The University will be represented by such persons as its President shall delegate. In the absence of a contrary delegation, it will be represented in regard to placement, assignment, and change or termination of assignment of Student Teachers, Practicum Students, and Participants by a "Director of Student Teaching or Field Experiences" and will be represented with respect to conduct of Student Teachers, Practicum Students, and Participants by a University Supervisor, or Subject Area Supervisor, or Course Instructor who will supervise the work of all Student Teachers, Practicum Students, and Participants under their direct jurisdiction.

The School Corporation shall be represented in dealing with the University by its Superintendent or by such other administrative personnel as he/she shall designate.

- 2. PLACEMENT OF STUDENT TEACHERS, PRACTICUM STUDENTS, AND PARTICIPANTS. The placement process shall be a cooperative venture involving both the University and the cooperating School Corporation.
 - a. Student Teachers and Practicum Students. Placement of a Student Teacher or Practicum Student shall be initiated by the University by filing an application for each proposed assignment setting out the background of the student and the type of assignment appropriate. The request may be accompanied by suggested names of teachers of the School Corporation, who would be recommended by the University as a Supervising Teacher.

Assignment of Student Teachers and Practicum Students shall be made by the School Corporation. Such assignment will be made after consultation with the Supervising Teacher and Principal under whom the assignment will be completed.

b. Participants. Requests for placement of Participants will be initiated by the University and may be either for an individual student or a composite form which would represent a group of students. The request will identify the student(s) background, the type of assignment requested, objectives of the assignment, and activities suggested as appropriate to the requested assignment.

Teachers who do not hold the Professional License may be used, at the discretion of the School Corporation and the University and with the concurrence of the teacher, as cooperating teachers for prestudent teaching experiences.

3. PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS. Both parties to this agreement have a right and an obligation to insist on standards of professional decorum on the part of Student Teachers, Practicum Students, and Participants that are consonant with prevailing standards in the school community and the education profession.

Neither party shall discriminate in the choice of schools, Supervising Teachers, or Student Teachers, Practicum Students, or Participants on the basis of race, religion, color, national origin, age or sex. Nor shall such opportunity be denied on grounds the University student is blind, deaf, or physically handicapped in some other manner, provided he/she is capable of performing the responsibilities of the position for which the assignment is sought.

- 4. STUDENT TEACHER, PRACTICUM STUDENT, AND PARTICIPANT SUPERVISION. Students shall be subject to the rules and regulations of the School Corporation and under the direction and control of the Supervising Teacher, Principal, and other administrative personnel while they are on the premises of the School Corporation or acting in behalf of the School Corporation in locations other than the premises. The following points have specific reference to the various types of supervisory responsibility:
 - a. The supervising Teacher may leave the classroom with the Student Teacher or Practicum Student in charge of the class, but the Supervising Teacher shall, at all times, retain the responsibility for control of the class and the program of instruction.
 - b. Students who are not licensed may not be used as a substitute for their Supervising or Cooperating Teacher or for any other licensed personnel except as authorized by the respective designated administrative personnel of the School Corporation and the University.
 - c. Students, with the exception of certain licensed interns, may not be compensated for any responsibilities which constitute all or a part of the required field experiences program.
 - d. Supervising and Cooperating Teachers shall file such reports as are prescribed by the University.
 - e. The University Supervisor or other designated representative of the University shall have access, at all reasonable times, to visit the classroom(s) to which the student is assigned.
- 5. TERMINATION OR CHANGE OF ASSIGNMENTS AND PROJECTS. Either the School Corporation or the University may, at any time, change or terminate the assignment of any Student Teacher,

Practicum Student, or Participant or any cooperatively developed project which involves field experience students.

Before either change or termination, all parties shall make reasonable efforts to consult with each other.

- 6. STATUS OF STUDENT TEACHERS, PRACTICUM STUDENTS, AND PARTICIPANTS. All students shall remain as students of the University and shall not be classified as employees of the School Corporation for any purpose, except as limited below:
 - a. Student Teacher, Practicum Students, and Participants shall be under the direction and control of the School Corporation as represented by the Supervising Teacher, Principal, and other administrative personnel while they are on the premises of the School Corporation or acting in behalf of the School Corporation in locations other than the premises.
 - b. The School Corporation shall provide Student Teachers, Practicum Students, and Participants the same protection against liability arising in connection with their assignments in the School Corporation

as is provided for members of the School Corporation's permanent faculty.

- 7. HONORARIUM. Any honorarium paid to the Supervising Teacher by Indiana State University will be paid directly to the Supervising Teacher for consultant services. If the honorarium paid by the University to the Supervising Teacher should ever be lawfully determined to be a wage rather than an honorarium by an instrumentality of the United States government, then the University shall be considered to be the Supervising Teacher's parttime employer.
- 8. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISION. This Agreement may be terminated either by the School Corporation or the University by giving the other party thirty (30) days prior written notice.

All notices to be given in this provision shall be properly given if they are sent by first-class mail to the Superintendent or other designated representative of the School Corporation and to the Coordinator of Field Experiences of the University.

CHAPTER 10

GENERAL POWERS-STUDENT TEACHER TRAINING

20-5-10-1 (28-4406). School corporation agreements with accredited institutions of higher education—Student teaching experience.

SECTION 1. Public school corporations are authorized to enter into agreements with institutions of higher education accredited by the Training and Licensing Commission of Indiana, for the purpose of providing teaching experience for students thereof preparing for the educational profession and for the services of persons working jointly for any such school corporation and any institution.

SECTION 2- (a) Each such agreement shall set out the responsibilities and rights of such public school corporation, such institutions, and such students or persons WHO SUPER VISE SUCH STUDENTS AND WHO ARE WORKING JOINTLY FOR ANY SUCH SCHOOL CORPORATION AND ANY SUCH INSTITUTION.

- (b) EACH AGREEMENT MUST CONTAIN:
 - (1) A PROVISION FOR THE PAYMENT OF AN HONORARIUM

FOR CONSULTING SERVICES BY THE INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION DIRECTLY TO THE SUPERVISOR; AND

- (2) A PROVISION THAT, IF THE SUM PAID BY THE INSTITUTION TO THE SUPERVISOR SHOULD EVER BE LAWFULLY DETERMINED TO BE A WAGE RATHER THAN AN HONORARIUM BY AN INSTRUMENTALITY OF THE UNITED STATES, THEN THE INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION SHALL BE CONSIDERED UNDER THE AGREEMENT TO BE THE SUPERVISOR'S PART-TIME EMPLOYER.
- (c) THE PROVISIONS REQUIRED BY SUBJECTION (b) OF THIS SECTION SHALL BE INCLUDED IN EVERY AGREEMENT ENTERED INTO OR RENEWED UNDER THIS CHAPTER AFTER JUNE 30, 1981. PUBLIC SCHOOL CORPORATIONS AND INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION SHALL REVISE ALL AGREEMENTS IN EFFECT ON JULY 1, 1981, TO INCLUDE THE PROVISIONS REQUIRED BY SUBSECTION (b) OF THIS SECTION.

SECTION 3. THIS ACT TAKES EFFECT JULY 1, 1981

Occupational Therapy - The use of purposeful activity designed to improve or restore functions which have been impaired due to congenital disability, illness, or injury; or, where the function has been permanently lost or reduced by illness or injury, to improve the individual's ability to perform those tasks required for independent functioning. The therapy must be ordered by a physician for the treatment of lost or impaired function due to illness or injury.

All therapies listed above are subject to any deductibles or coinsurance. When services are provided by an outpatient provider individual, payment is limited to \$2500 per calendar year for each type of therapy.

MINUTES INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

FEBRUARY 1, 1991

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in regular session at 9:30 a.m. on Friday, February 1, 1991, in the Trustees Meeting Room, 11th Floor, School of Business.

Trustees present: Dr. Anthis, Mr. Green, Miss Lueken, Mr. O'Neill, Mr. Smith, Mr. Stelle, Mr. Winchell and Dr. Zietlow. Trustee absent: Mr. Breeden.

President Landini, Vice Presidents Clokey, Dahl, Edgerton, Graham and Schafer were present. Also attending were Professor Richard Spear, Chairperson, University Faculty Senate, and Mr. Eugene Dooley, President, Student Government Association.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Green called the meeting to order at 9:35 a.m.

SECTION I

A. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF DECEMBER 7, 1990

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Dr. Zietlow, the minutes of the December 7, 1990 meeting were approved as presented.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The dates for the next meeting are February 28 and March 1, 1991.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Board Seminar

Mr. Green expressed his appreciation to Dr. Anthis for conducting the seminar on Thursday afternoon. He felt the participation by trustees and administration was useful. He noted the planning discussion would be continued.

Enrollment

Dr. Clokey reported the official 1991 spring semester enrollment as 11,097, a decrease of two percent from spring 1990. A decline was anticipated since the fall semester enrollment had decreased slightly. He was encouraged by a

two per cent increase in the retention rate from fall to spring semesters. Even with the decrease in headcount, the spring enrollment total is the highest in the last five years. The shift to Hoosier students is continuing as the out of state enrollment reflects a small but steady decline.

Dr. Zietlow asked what the new majority age reflected in the enrollment figures might be. Dr. Clokey responded that non-traditional students still tend to be part-time, and it is anticipated this pattern will continue. There is no indication of a sharp increase in the age of students enrolled. A "College Night" program to publicize offerings for non-traditional students has been in operation for two years. Course offerings in late afternoon and evening hours are being expanded.

Military Duty

Mr. Green wondered how many students were lost because of activation of military reservists. Mr. Edgerton responded that approximately 75 students have withdrawn because of military duty. However, there is no practical way to know how many student reservists completed the fall semester and did not enroll for the spring semester. Mr. Edgerton noted such students are withdrawn without grade penalty and with full tuition refunded. Residence hall fees are pro-rated for actual occupancy days. He also commented that their return to the University will be facilitated.

Mr. Green asked how many faculty and staff have been affected. Dr. Clokey said that so far two faculty members have been called although more are anticipated. Mr. Schafer stated that four inquiries were received from bi-weekly staff, but he was not aware of any actual call ups at this time.

University School

In mid-January Vice President Clokey addressed a memorandum to the Acting Dean of the School of Education on the future operation of the University School. He asked the Acting Dean to advise colleagues in the University School and School of Education of the substance of the memorandum. President Landini indicated that he and Vice President Clokey have also addressed this issue with the Faculty Senate Executive Committee on four occasions.

The University School under a ten year agreement with the Vigo County School Corporation, performed a service for the people of Terre Haute and the school corporation, in grades K-9. In the 1989-90 year the enrollment of the school was about 500. This year the number enrolled is less than 500. The agreement

with the Vigo County School Corporation was renewed for one year (1990-91), so that further consideration could be given to future funding. It seems likely that another one year extension, 1991-92, will be agreeable to the Corporation and the University.

During the negotiations with the Vigo County School Corporation increased per capita funding was requested as well as capital funds for building improvement. Corporation schools are funded at \$3,200 per student while the University School is currently funded at \$1,900 by the Corporation. The University requested an increase (of \$1,300) to \$3,200 per student for the University School and capital funds to assist an estimated \$8 million in building renovation and with improvements. Approximately \$1 million has been spent on the roof and window replacements. After many meetings formal and informal with representatives of the school corporation the answer to both proposals was no.

Dr. Clokey indicated that a decision on the future operation of the school must be made before the end of the 1990-91 school year. Operation beyond the 1991-92 year is at question. Continuation of the current program is no longer economically feasible. Past requests for increased state funding have not been favorably received. The School of Education has been invited to present proposals which address funding and capital needs for the continued operation of a reconfigured University School program.

Mr. Green asked if the Vigo County School Corporation gave a reason for not wanting to increase funding. Dr. Clokey responded that the Corporation is faced with similar budget constraints and did not feel they could invest additional dollars in the operation.

Dr. Anthis commented that after forty years experience in public schools he is very sympathetic toward the Vigo County School Corporation and the problems they face. Such situations are difficult. However, as an ISU Trustee, this problem must be resolved for the University. The University must take whatever steps are necessary to resolve the problem even though we are sympathetic to the Vigo County School Corporation. It must be looked at as a situation in which each of the parties has problems, and it has come to a point where a reasonable solution does not appear at this time.

President Landini confirmed that this is exactly the message he has been trying to give. Nothing he has said is to find distress or unhappiness with the school corporation, but we are at something of an impasse. The University will do SECTION I PAGE FOUR

everything it can to be sure the Vigo County School Corporation does not feel the University is faulting them for their position. Both of us must get on with the business of educating students.

President Landini reported receiving two letter from parents of students in the University School expressing concerns about the possible closing of the school and praising the quality of the faculty and the programs offered. He noted the quality, dedication, and concern of the faculty of the school has never been at issue. The issue is one of funds to continue what we have been doing. The University's job of work is to produce the best possible teachers, but not necessarily to provide an educational program for the School Corporation.

Dr. Clokey stated that a report should be forthcoming from the School of Education some time in March. It is anticipated that President Landini will present a recommendation to the Board at the April meeting.

Legislative Budget Request, 1991-93

Mr. Graham commented that most discussion in the General Assembly thus far has centered on reduced revenues and budget cuts/reductions. Based on revenue forecasts and with no tax increase, some budget reductions will be necessary. While the numbers are not final, the cuts could range from one to five per cent.

President Landini observed that these are the opening stages of the legislative session. There is a great deal more to be said and heard. Our report is something of a statement as to where we are and what the legislature is saying. There may be severe limits on financial resources to the State, to state agencies, to education in general and higher education in particular. There are many reports coming from the media but it falls on the President and and Vice Presidents to address themselves to the many complications and to our colleagues and associates as to what these reports mean. This is a subject of considerable interest to the institution. Further information will be shared with the Board as the current session progresses.

An agreement in the amount of \$72,950 has been received from the Indiana State Chamber of Commerce for the project entitled, "Terre Haute Area Small Business Development Center," under the direction of Mr. Willliam C. Minnis, School of Business, for the project period January 1, 1991 through December 31, 1991. The Indiana State University cash contribution is \$36,475. Also, the University will waive \$39,587 indirect costs.

2. <u>Commission on the Bicentennial of The United States</u>
<u>Constitution, Fund No. 46481, Proposal No. 2868</u>

A grant in the amount of \$6,282.15 has been received from the Commission on the Bicentennial of The United States Constitution for the project entitled, "The Bill of Rights and the Limits of Individual Liberty," under the direction of Dr. William Giffin, Department of History, for the period September 1, 1990 through November 20, 1991. The Indiana State University cash contribution is \$4,713 and the Indiana State University in-kind contribution is \$580.

N. UNIVERSITY HOUSING POLICY

The University housing policy stipulates which students are required to live in the residence halls and which students may be exceptions to the requirement to live on campus.

The present housing policy reads in part:

Students who have earned less than sixty-two (62) hours of credit as of the first day of registration for the fall semester, or students who have not become twenty (20) years of age on or before September 30, must live in housing facilities maintained by the University unless they commute from their parents' home or have a valid exception.

It is proposed to change the University housing policy effective with the beginning of the fall semester, 1991. The proposed change is as follows:

Freshman and sophomore students (less than 62 earned academic hours) are required to live in University residence halls unless they commute from their parents' home or have a valid exception. Students of freshman or sophomore standing who have lived in University residence halls for four semesters are exempt from this policy.

The proposed change in the language will clarify the policy and make it easier to enforce. The change should also have a positive effect upon the occupancy rates in the residence halls. Students who have had life experiences which should exempt them from the requirement will be able to apply for exceptions to the policy and live in housing of their own choice.

Recommendation: Approval of the change in the housing policy as indicated effective with the begining of the fall semester, 1991.

O. LEASE AGREEMENT WITH MARRIOTT FSM CORPORATION

On June 23, 1989, the Indiana State University Board of Trustees approved a resolution to enter into an agreement with the Marriott Corporation to provide board plans, catering, and retail food operations for the University.

Memorandum of Agreement Between

Parkview Memorial Hospital Speech Pathology Department and Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana

I. Introduction

This clinical education agreement was made and entered into January 31, 1991, by and between the Speech Pathology Department at Parkview Memorial Hospital, Fort Wayne, Indiana (Hospital) and Indiana State University (University).

II. Purpose

This document establishes agreement between the above parties in regard to their cooperation in the implementation of clinical education externship opportunities for Speech Pathology graduate students. It defines the basis by which Parkview Memorial Hospital will serve as a clinical training facility for graduate students.

III. University Responsibilities

- A. Accept full responsibility for planning and implementing the educational program for Speech Pathology students and for determining adequate preparation in theoretical knowledge, basic clinical skills, professional ethics, attitudes, and behaviors.
- B. Designate an Educational Coordinator to serve as liaison between the University and the Hospital. This coordinator will plan and coordinate the clinical experience to occur preferably during the semester before graduation.
- C. Provide the Hospital with course transcripts, description of completed clinical experience, and outline of clinical goals of the prospective graduate extern.
- D. Arrange a conference with the student and clinical supervisor in consideration of placement with the Hospital preferably 3-6 months prior to the desired externship period.
- E. Provide assurance that professional liability insurance is in effect for students during the externship.

IV. Hospital Responsibilities

- A. Designate an ASHA certified staff member to be responsible for coordinating and supervising a broadly-based clinical experience.
- B. Determine availability and willingness to accept graduate externships during any given time period. (Current policy is to accept 1 student with stipend/housing option for each of fall and spring semesters, and a possible summer externship with no stipend/housing benefit).
- C. Interview and select students for externships according to student qualifications, priority, guidelines, and compatibility with department/hospital program.
- D. Maintain a sufficient level of staff support to provide supervision of students and to carry out normal service functions without having students perform in lieu of staff.
- E. Inform the student of departmental and hospital expectations, policies and procedures which will serve as guidelines for dress code, personal conduct, confidentiality and patient evaluation and treatment during the externship.
- F. Encourage the student to participate in observations and learning experiences, such as staff conferences, inservices, rehab meetings and similar activities at the discretion of the clinical supervisor.
- G. Provide the student with at least one midterm and one end of the term conference with a written performance evaluation. Submit written evaluation of the student's competence to the University at the end of the externship.
- H. Notify the University of any situation or problems which may threaten the student's successful completion of the externship.
- I. Accept responsibility for all patient care.

V. Joint Responsibilities

- A. Neither party shall unlawfully discriminate against any student on the basis of race, religion, sex, color, age, handicap, national origin or military service.
- B. Withdrawal of a student from the externship may be requested by either party under mutually agreed upon conditions.

VI. Student Responsibilities

- A. Request placement 3-6 months in advance of the externship.
- B. Commit to 8-12 weeks duration of the externship. (Exceptions will be made at the discretion of the clinical supervisor with preference given to full-term externs.)
- C. Provide clinical supervisor with a resume and ASHA clinical hours requested during the externship.
- D. Maintain a minimum of \$ 1,000,000/\$3,000,000 professional liability insurance during the externship.
- E. Follow departmental and hospital policies and procedures throughout the externship.
- F. Participate in clinical evaluation of self, supervisor and program at midterm and end-of-term.

VII. Terms of Agreement

- A. This agreement shall become effective immediately and renewed annually.
- B. This agreement may be discontinued by either party with a sixty (60) day written notice.
- C. If it is necessary to discontinue the externship program, it shall not become effective until any students in that period have completed their experience.
- D. This agreement is subject to changes and revision as necessary and by agreement of the parties concerned, or at annual review.

GENERAL RELEASE AND WAIVER

This General Release and Waiver ("Release") is agreed and entered into on this 31 day of January , 1991, by and between Fred W. Draper (hereinafter "Employee") and Indiana State University (hereinafter "University").

- 1. The purpose of this Release is to resolve all matters relating to or growing out of the Employee's employment with the University, including but in no way limited to the charge of discrimination filed with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (Charge No.: 240-90-0892).
- 2. No part of this Release or any action on the part of the University in settling or resolving all matters concerning the Employee's employment shall be considered or constituted an admission by the University of any wrongful conduct or violation of any law or that the Employee was entitled to any relief for any action taken by the University in any form whatsoever. The Employer's purpose for entering into this Agreement is solely to avoid the further time and expense required to defend this matter.
- 3. For and in consideration of the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) the Employee does hereby, for himself, his family, dependents, executors, heirs, administrators and assigns, release, demise, acquit and forever discharge the University, its attorneys, agents, servants, employees, officers, directors, subsidiaries, parent corporation, affiliates, successors and assigns, of and from any and all injuries, causes of actions, contract remedies or actions, claims, demands, liabilities, suits, remedies under any collective bargaining agreement, fringe benefits, attorney's fees, expenses, unemployment benefits, compensation, vacation pay, accrued leave, sums of money, promotions, reinstatement, reemployment, damages and rights of any kind and nature whatsoever, in law or in equity, now existing in favor of the Employee, and against the University, by reason of any facts existing at the date hereof, whether known or unknown, fixed or contingent, by any reason whatsoever without exception or reservation.
- 4. The Employee acknowledges that he has read and understands the contents of this Release and that he is fully advised of the legal consequence of this Release, and that neither the University nor any other person or entity has made any representations to him which have not been expressly stated in this Release.
- 5. The Employee agrees to keep the terms, amount and facts of this Release completely confidential and will not hereinafter disclose any information concerning the Agreement to anyone, including, but in no way limited to any past, present or prospective employee of the University or applicant to the University for employment.

F. STUDENT HEALTH INSURANCE MASTER CONTRACT, 1991-92

During the 1990-91 school year, student group health insurance has been provided by Mid-West National Life Insurance Company. The contract expires on August 22, 1991. The Student Affairs Health Insurance Committee solicited proposals from twenty-two firms to provide a program of coverage that incorporated consideration of the medical services and facilities available in the Student Health Center and at a premium schedule which is within the budget of students.

Parker and Parker Consultants, Inc. of St. Petersburg, Florida, has proposed and the Student Health Insurance Committee has endorsed a one-year contract (with renewal option) underwritten with Mid-West National Life Insurance Company of Tennessee. Recommendation: Approval of the award of the student health insurance master contract to Parker and Parker Consultants, Inc. of St. Petersburg, Florida, and underwritten with Mid-West National Life Insurance Company effective August 23, 1991, under a one-year contract with renewal option.

G. NURSING LABORATORY FEES

The cost of equipment and supplies used by students in the Nursing Laboratory has exceeded budget increases over the past several years. To provide essential supplies, materials and equipment for laboratory instruction, additional funds are necessary.

Recommendation: Increase the laboratory fee for Nursing 105 from \$25 to \$50 and for Nursing 305 from \$30 to \$50, and assess a \$10 laboratory fee in other selected nursing courses.

H. DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY CONSUMABLE MATERIALS FEE

In the last decade the cost of laboratory consumables in the Department of Chemistry has nearly doubled, well beyond increases in university supplies and expenses budgets. To avoid retrenchment and curtailment in laboratory experimentation, funds are needed to meet the cost of these materials.

Recommendation: Assess a consumable materials fee of \$10 for students taking a chemistry laboratory (CHEM OOOL) course.

I. TERRE HAUTE CENTER FOR MEDICAL EDUCATION

Indiana University has approved the following additional allocation for the Terre Haute Center for Medical Education:

Supplies and Expense \$17,412

Indiana University will reimburse Indiana State University for all expenses incurred by the Terre Haute Center for Medical Education.

Recommendation: Approval of the allocation.

J. CENTRAL CHILLED WATER PLANT

Legislation presently before the Indiana General Assembly includes bonding authorization under IC 20-12-6 for a Central Chilled Water Plant to be constructed on the campus at Indiana State University in an amount of \$6,000,000.

The project consists of the construction of a Central Chilled Water Plant and distribution piping. The plant will initially provide chilled water for 19 buildings. It is designed to allow for future expansion in order to provide chilled water to the remaining educational buildings on campus. The project will replace old, failing chilled water equipment and will provide a more efficient and reliable system which will be easier to service. The project will be funded from the operational savings of having a central system.

Recommendation: Subject to approval of bonding authorization for the Central Chilled Water Plant by the Indiana General Assembly in Special Session, authorization of the President and/or Treasurer to request from the Commission for Higher Education, the State Budget Agency, the State Budget Committee and the Governor of the State of Indiana authority to expend \$6,000,000 for the project for which the 1991 General Assembly approved the issuance of \$6,000,000 of bonds under 20-12-6 and further authorize the Treasurer of the University to take the following action:

- a. To engage engineers in connection with the project;
- b. To enter into contracts to construct, equip, finance and otherwise provide for the Central Chilled Water Plant and related facilities;
- c. To use receipts from fees and earnings and operational savings for the construction and financing of the project to the extent necessary; and
- d. To develop a plan of financing for submission to the Board, including the selection of Underwriters or Bankers, to result in the eventual issuance and sale of academic facilities bonds in an amount not exceeding the total estimated cost as finally determined to finance the project.

SECTION I

K. RESIDENCE HALL RATES, 1991-92

Residence hall rates for the 1991-92 academic year are presented below. Operating expenses, occupancy levels, and the opening of the retail/food court in the Hulman Memorial Student Union resulted in the proposed increases.

Three food service plans are available to residence hall students for 1991-92. The plans are designed to provide maximum flexibility for residence hall students to meet their food service needs. The standard plan has more credits (to be used in Lincoln Quad and Sycamore Towers food services) and a smaller number of points (to be used in the food services in The Commons in HMSU). The special plan has more points than credits and the transition plan is designed to meet the needs of students who require less food service in their housing arrangements. An option of "plus points" is also available to be added to either the standard or the special plans.

M. MOTOR VEHICLE REGULATIONS

Revised motor vehicle regulations effective July 1, 1991 are presented in Exhibit B. Changes include the elimination of "Resident" and "Commuter" student categories and clarification of the inclusion of the Family Housing area in the enforcement guidelines. Permit fees remain the same for 1991-92.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approval of the revised motor vehicle regulations presented in Exhibit B, effective July 1, 1991.

N. UNIVERSITY SCHOOL

The University administration recommends the discontinuance of the University School, grades kindergarten through 9, in two stages. Grades 7, 8 and 9 will be discontinued effective May 30, 1991. Grades K-6 will be discontinued effective May 29, 1992. The agreement between Indiana State University and the Vigo County School Corporation, in effect through June 30, 1991, will be revised to be effective in the 1991-92 fiscal year and submitted to the Board of Trustees at the June 1991, meeting.

Recommendation: Approval of the recommendation.

O. PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The University administration recommends the establishment and operation of a professional development center under the administrative management of the School of Education, to begin July 1, 1992, and continue through June 30, 1997. The purpose and nature of the center, the provisions established for the successful operation of the center, and a schedule of review and evaluation procedures are presented in Exhibit C. An agreement between the University and the Vigo County School Corporation for the offering of programs during the time specified will be submitted to the Board of Trustees prior to the June, 1992 meeting.

Recommendation: Approval of the recommendation.

P. APPLIED MUSIC FEE

Recommendation: Approval of an increase in the Applied Music Fee from \$25 to \$30 effective with the Fall Semester of 1991. This fee was last changed in 1982.

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY

1991 - 1992 MOTOR VEHICLE REGULATIONS

The following regulations shall govern the operation and parking of motor vehicles on the campus of Indiana State University at all times of the year unless specifically noted.

Students and staff who bring vehicles to campus will be held responsible for the registration and proper operation of their vehicles. It is the responsibility of each member of the University community to read, understand, and abide by the regulations. Ignorance of the regulations is not an acceptable reason for appeal of a violation.

ARTICLE I - PARKING PERMIT REGISTRATION

Section A. General Guidelines

- 1. Parking permits will be required on all self-propelled vehicles that require a state license or any other vehicle capable of being operated under its own power.
- 2. All faculty, staff, and students who own, possess, operate, or have the use of a motor vehicle on any property owned, leased, or used by Indiana State University, including the Family Housing area, between the hours of 7:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M., Monday through Friday, must purchase and properly display a current parking permit from the rearview mirror, except as provided in Section D following.
- 3. The enforcement boundaries are identified as Third street (west), the Seaboard Railroad (east), the Conrail Railroad (north), and Cherry street (south). Enforcement also includes the Family Housing area.
- 4. Fees are \$30.00 per automobile parking permit and \$10.00 per motorcycle parking permit. Faculty, staff, and students are required to obtain a parking permit at the Safety and Security Office within 72 hours (excluding weekends) after arriving on campus or beginning employment. Only one parking permit may be purchased per student or employee.

Section B. Limitations

1. Faculty, staff, and students may not obtain a parking permit for a non-qualified user of the parking permit. Therefore, obtaining or attempting to obtain a parking permit, or using a parking permit, or providing a parking permit for which the intended user is not qualified is expressly prohibited by this regulation. See Article VI.

Section C. Type of Registration

1. HANDICAP - Handicap parking permits are available for faculty, staff, and students, who are qualified under Indiana Code 5-16-9-1 or Indiana Code 9-7-4.1. Persons with short term

medical requirements should consult with Traffic and Parking Services.

- 2. STAFF Faculty members, administrative staff, clerical/ service employees, and non-student temporary employees shall be defined as STAFF for purposes of vehicle registration only.
- 3. STUDENT Graduate students, undergraduates, Graduate Assistants, Graduate Fellows, and all others enrolled who are not full time Residence Hall Directors and Assistant Directors shall be defined as STUDENT for purposes of vehicle registration only.
- 4. TEMPORARY Temporary parking permits are available for short term parking needs. The cost of the temporary parking permit is \$1.00 minimum. Additional use beyond one day will be assessed \$1.00 charge per day. Consult with the Traffic and Parking Services.

Section D. Display of Parking Permit

- 1. All parking permits are available at the Office of Safety and Security. Staff and Student parking permits are issued for the school year and expire midnight August 15. The parking permit may be transferred to other motor vehicles driven to campus. Enforcement of the Traffic and Parking Regulations is in effect every day throughout the calendar year.
- 2. The transferable parking permit is to be displayed by hanging from the rearview mirror. <u>EXCEPTION: Motorcycles and vehicles without rearview mirrors should consult with the Traffic and Parking Services office at Safety and Security.</u>
- 3. A vehicle not displaying a parking permit will be treated as an unregistered vehicle.
- 4. Motor bikes, scooters, and motorcycles shall affix the parking permit to the left front fork of the vehicle. If in doubt, consult with the Traffic and Parking Services office at Safety and Security.
- 5. If a parking permit becomes lost or stolen, it becomes the responsibility of the registrant to replace it immediately. Replacement hang tags are obtained from the Traffic and Parking Services office at Safety and Security, at a cost of \$30.00 for automobiles and \$10.00 for motorcycles.
- 6. President's Society permits, issued through the office of Development and Public Affairs, are recognized for parking privileges for all lots with the exception of the Visitors Pay Lot and the Root Hall Psychology Clinic Lot. These permits are to be affixed to the front windshield, driver's side window, or hung from the vehicle rearview mirror.

ARTICLE II - Operation of Motor Vehicles

1. The operation and/or parking of all MOTORIZED VEHICLES in the Pedestrian Plaza (identified portions of 6th and Chestnut streets) and Sycamore Walkway is expressly PROHIBITED. EXCEPTION: Identified University service related vehicles and emergency vehicles.

- 2. Congestion requires that speed be limited to 10 MPH on campus drives and University parking lots.
- 3. The driver of a motor vehicle will have control of that vehicle at all times and failure to do so will constitute reckless driving.
- 4. All traffic control signs and devices must be observed as others are depending on your judgment and consistent with law.
- 5. In areas where motor vehicle traffic and pedestrian traffic conflict, pedestrians have the right-of-way when no other traffic control is present.
- 6. No vehicles will be operated on the sidewalks or lawns of the campus.
- 7. All vehicles, including two wheel vehicles, must be equipped with adequate exhaust mufflers as required by Indiana statutes.
- 8. Drivers will comply with the State of Indiana Motor Vehicle Code and Terre Haute City Ordinances at all times in addition to these regulations.
- 9. All accidents involving a motor vehicle on property owned, leased, or used by Indiana State University or the streets adjacent thereto must be reported to the Safety and Security Office as soon as possible.

ARTICLE III - Parking Regulations

- 1. Motor vehicles operated by faculty, staff, and students that display a parking permit may park in areas designated as parking lots by signs posted thereon.
- 2. Handicap spaces, timed parking areas, fire zones, service vehicle zones, and unloading/loading zones indicated by signs will be strictly enforced at all times.
- 3. A parked vehicle which interferes with normal vehicular or pedestrian traffic may be removed at the owner's expense.
- 4. Students with a permanent or temporary disability who require special parking privileges should receive a certificate from the Student Health Center and present the certificate to the Traffic and Parking Services office at Safety and Security. Faculty and Staff with a permanent or temporary disability shall advise the Traffic and Parking Services office at Safety and Security of their status in order to receive special parking privileges.

ARTICLE IV - OFF STREET PARKING LOTS

- 1. STAFF Permit Off street parking is available in designated STAFF or ANY PERMIT parking lots.
- 2. STUDENT Permit Off street parking is available in designated STUDENT or ANY PERMIT parking lots.
- 3. VISITORS PAY LOT The lots located at 6th and Cherry streets and 5th and Chestnut streets are available for short term parking

Monday through Friday including evening hours. Patrons are required to pay the lot attendant before exiting the parking lot. Overnight parking is prohibited. Vehicles parked improperly on the lots may be removed at the owner's expense.

- 4. Parking lots are surveyed and parking is arranged to accommodate as many cars as possible. It is necessary to follow the arrangement to allow other vehicles access to and from parking areas. Parking spaces on asphalt and gravel lots are identified by painted stalls and concrete bumpers respectively. Therefore, this section prohibits parking in any driveway, alley, lot entrance or exit. AREAS MARKED WITH A YELLOW BUMPER ARE NOT VALID PARKING SPACES.
- 5. Do not park on unmarked open spaces. Such space may be private property, the owner of which will have the car removed at your expense.
- 6. Between the hours of 5:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M., Monday through Friday, faculty, staff, students, and visitors may use any parking lot. EXCEPTION: Designated NO PARKING areas, Handicap parking spaces, the VISITOR'S PAY LOT at 6th and Cherry streets, and the Psychology Clinic lot.
- 7. When parking vehicles on the campus, use parking lots/spaces designated for that purpose.
- 8. Vehicles parked on University property must be properly licensed, display a current parking permit, be in a state of good repair, and operable.

ARTICLE V - ENFORCEMENT

- 1. Enforcement of University Traffic Regulations, which include State laws and City ordinances, is the responsibility of the Safety and Security Office and will be accomplished by supervised University Police personnel and Traffic and Parking Services personnel. University Police Officers have the authority to halt vehicles, issue summonses for violations, remove vehicles improperly parked, enforce all traffic regulations, and to make arrests. (IND. Code 1971 20-12 CH. 3.5).
- 2. Traffic summonses issued by authorized University Police personnel and Traffic and Parking Services personnel for violation of these rules must be presented to the Traffic and Parking Services office at Safety and Security within 72 hours of the time appearing on the summons (weekends excluded). After 72 hours summonses are processed and billed to individual accounts through the Business Office. Once the summonses have been billed, fines cannot be adjusted or payments accepted by the Safety and Security office.
- 3. The person in whose name a parking permit is registered with Indiana State University will be held responsible for any parking violation involving the vehicle whether incurred by the registrant or the operator of the motor vehicle. Therefore, these regulations should be made known to any other person who may operate the vehicle.

- 4. The operator of a motor vehicle on campus shall observe these regulations and will be held responsible for all moving violations committed, whether the vehicle is registered in the operator's name or not.
- 5. Violators of State and City laws may be, at the discretion of the Safety and Security Office, prosecuted in State or City courts.
- 6. Vehicles will be towed from the campus if the vehicle violates University Regulations, City of Terre Haute ordinances, and/or State of Indiana laws pertaining to motor vehicles, or if said vehicle constitutes a traffic/pedestrian hazard. The owner/registrant of the vehicle will be responsible for any fines assessed and the cost of towing. Vehicles may be towed for the following reasons, but not limited to:
 - A) Parked in space identified for handicapped parking.
 - B) Blocking a fire hydrant, walkway, or roadway.
 - C) Parked in an emergency lane.
 - D) Overtime parking in a designated loading or timed zone.
 - E) Abandoned/immobile vehicles.
 - F) Five or more parking tickets during the fiscal year (July 1 June 30).
 - G) Visitor's Pay Lot violation.

ARTICLE VI - CITATION PROCEDURES

Section A. Penalties

- 1. False Registration Falsely obtaining or using a parking permit that the user is not qualified \$100.00, to which may be added the loss of the privilege of having a motor vehicle on campus for the remainder of the current academic year.
- 2. Failure to obtain an ISU parking permit within 72 hours of bringing an unregistered vehicle on campus \$5.00.
- Moving Violation \$25.00.
- 4. Parking in an identified handicapped parking space \$30.00.
- 5. All other violations \$5.00.

Section B. Assessments

- 1. Traffic assessments will be made at the Safety and Security Office and are payable at the Business Office.
- 2. Students who do not pay assessments or summonses by the end of the semester or term in which they are incurred will result in the permit to register being denied the following and subsequent semesters and terms and all records of the student being encumbered until the assessment is paid.
- 3. Faculty and staff having any outstanding, unpaid summonses will be denied a parking permit unless and until the assessment is paid.

4. The assessments shall be the sum of the separate violations on each summons.

ARTICLE VII - APPEALS

Summonses may be appealed by written application forms provided by the Safety and Security Office if requested within 72 hours of the TIME appearing on the summons and returned within five (5) days of the DATE that appears on the summons.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CENTER

A professional development center is proposed as an innovative setting which will enhance the central missions of the School of Education to prepare prospective teachers and other school professional, to contribute to the enhancement of skills and professional renewal of experienced teachers, and to advance research in and development of public school education. The intent of the center is to provide an environment in which experienced and prospective teachers, University faculty and school administrators work together to improve the quality and effectiveness of teaching and learning in the public schools.

The center will promote functional collaboration between University faculty and the public school systems in Vigo and surrounding counties in West Central Indiana. Curricular models, teaching strategies, insights about the learning process gained from scholarly inquiry and research, and other initiatives to advance change in public school education will be introduced and tested in the center, leading to the incorporation of successful innovations at additional public school sites.

The center will offer to teachers and administrators throughout the area the opportunity to observe, demonstrate and participate in center classrooms and to learn about processes for school renewal.

The center will train clinical faculty and public school counterparts to supervise student teachers, thus changing the traditional reliance upon University faculty and improving the preparation of teachers in public school settings.

The center will contract with area school corporations and agencies to provide innovative environments for preschool and special population instruction.

The center will develop collaborative programs in early childhood, preschool and special education classrooms, including several kindergarten and elementary school program classes.

PROVISIONS FOR THE CREATION AND OPERATION OF THE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CENTER, SCHOOL OF EDUCATION

- 1. The Vigo County School Corporation must agree, prior to July 1, 1992, a) to revise the present school district now served by the University School, b) to facilitate and support the attainment of requisite enrollments in the Center, and c) to provide qualified personnel to fulfill the special services contracts undertaken by the Corporation. These conditions must be incorporated in a written agreement approved by the Corporation and the University's Board of Trustees prior to an effective date of July 1, 1992.
- At the start of the Center's third year of operation, 1994-95, the University's annual financial support of the Center's operating budget will be not higher than \$250,000.
- 3. The gross square footage of space assigned to the Center in the building presently accommodating the University School will be not greater than 50% of the total; and the remaining 50% of the total will be assigned to other and different University units for other purposes.
- 4. Prior to the start of the 1995-96 academic year, the University must receive formal authority from State government to renovate the entire building in which the Center is located.
- 5. The Center must be maintained in the 1991-92, 1992-93, and 1993-94 years at no more than regular or routine repair and maintenance costs; and any and all major renovation of that half (50%) of the building assigned to the Center will be funded by new and additional State appropriations authorized for that purpose.
- 6. Grades 7, 8, and 9 of the University School will be discontinued at the end of the 1990-91 academic year. All remaining grades of the University School, as it is presently organized and operated, will be discontinued at the end of the 1991-92 academic year. The University will not operate and maintain the University School, therefore, after the 1991-92 academic year.
- 7. The Center will begin its operations at the start of the 1992-93 year. In 1995-96--that is, the fourth year of operation--the University will undertake a review of the Center to determine its general effectiveness, its values and importances to the School of Education and the University, and its success in meeting the provisions prescribed here and now. Guided by the counsel of the Dean of the School of Education, the Vice President for Academic Affairs will propose in the 1991-92 academic year the criteria and

standards by which the Center will be evaluated. The President of the University will present to the University's Board of Trustees, in the spring semester, 1996, a recommendation on the future of the Center beyond the following, 1996-97, academic year.

- 8. Unless and until the University's Board of Trustees formally acts to the contrary, the Center will have an operational life span of five years, 1992-93 through 1997-98.
- 9. The Vigo County School Corporation and the University must reach agreement on the provisions stated in this document prior to July 1, 1991.

There is an ISU in-kind contribution of \$23,113 and there is a third party cash contribution of \$6,025.

6. <u>McDonnell Douglas Corporation</u>, Fund No. 46517, Proposal No. 2855

A grant of software for use on the Microvax II has been received from the McDonnell Douglas Corporation, under the direction of Dr. Paul Mausel, Department of Geography and Geology, for the project period April 24, 1990 through March 31, 1993. There is an ISU cash contribution of \$12,000, also there is an ISU in-kind contribution of \$16,280.

7. <u>Indiana Humanities Council and the Indiana Historical</u> Society, Fund No. 46518, Proposal No. 3021

An agreement in the amount of \$2,500 has been received from the Indiana Humanities Council and the Indiana Historical Society for the project entitled, "The Martin Photograph Collection-Preserving a University's Portrait," under the direction of Mr. J. Thomas Brown, University Archivist, for the project period June 1, 1991 through May 31, 1992. There is an ISU cash contribution of \$2,500 and an in-kind contribution of \$2,975. Also, the University will waive \$450 indirect costs.

I. PROPOSED UNIVERSITY BUDGETS, 1991-92

Operating budgets for public higher education institutions, including Indiana State University, have not been appropriated by the Indiana General Assembly and approved by the Governor. The University administration is constrained, nevertheless, to construct operating, auxiliary and student service budgets for the 1991-92 fiscal year, prepared and proposed for the continued operation of the University after June 30, 1991. The operational budget proposed at this time is informed by several presumptions based on experience, observations of discussions within the General Assembly, and on oral and written exchanges between and among representatives of state government and its public universities.

The principal presumptions in the proposed budget, presented in Exhibit E, are these:

-- tuition and fee increase for resident undergraduate and graduate students at approximately (and not to exceed) 8%;

- -- tuition and fee increase for nonresident undergraduate and graduate students at approximately (and not to exceed) 9%;
- -- salary increases for full time staff (prorated if less than full time) according to the following formula:

all salaries up to \$19,999	\$ 500
\$20,000 - \$29,999	\$ 600
\$30,000 - \$39,999	\$ 700
\$40,000 - \$49,999	\$ 800
\$50,000 - \$59,999	\$ 900
\$60,000 and above	\$ 1,000

Recommendation: Approval of authority for the President and the Vice President for Business Affairs to proceed toward the implementation of the proposed operating budget and to effect this budget, and corresponding auxiliary and student service budgets, on July 1, 1991, presuming that actions taken by the General Assembly and approved by the Governor prior to July 1, 1991, support the provisions as presented above. Detailed budgets will be presented to the Board for confirmation and ratification at the July 19, 1991 meeting of the Board. Should there be any substantive differences between the operating budget proposed here and the budgets submitted to the Board at the July meeting, the administration will identify each of the changes or differences and the reasons for those changes. AGREEMENT REGARDING RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY, THE ASSOCIATION FOR INDIANA MEDIA EDUCATORS, AND PROFESSOR LAWRENCE RECK

This agreement, made and entered into by and between INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES, with principal offices in the City of Terre Haute, Vigo County, Indiana, hereinafter referred to as "University" and the ASSOCIATION FOR INDIANA MEDIA EDUCATORS, hereinafter referred to as AIME, and Professor Lawrence Reck, hereinafter referred to as RECK,

WITNESSETH THAT

WHEREAS AIME is a professional association providing services to educators throughout the public schools of Indiana, and

WHEREAS UNIVERSITY, as a publicly-assisted university has included in its mission the education of persons who will teach in the public schools of Indiana, and

WHEREAS UNIVERSITY also includes in its mission the provision of service to the people of the state of Indiana, and

WHEREAS AIME is in need of office space, professional assistance and clerical support which UNIVERSITY has both the ability and the desire to provide, and

WHEREAS RECK is a member of the faculty of UNIVERSITY and has previously rendered professional assistance to AIME, and

WHEREAS the provision of the aforementioned assistance by UNIVERSITY and RECK to AIME would be beneficial to all parties,

NOW, THEREFORE, FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL COVENANTS CONTAINED HEREIN, THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. UNIVERSITY, through its School of Education, will provide office space, furniture and equipment appropriate to the purposes and public image of AIME for its use throughout the term of this agreement. It is anticipated that the aformentioned will be provided by UNIVERSITY on the premises of its School of Education.
- 2. UNIVERSITY will provide secretarial assistance of up to twenty hours per week to serve the Executive Secretary and the membership of AIME. All secretarial assistance provided will be through the personnel office of UNIVERSITY, subject to all employment conditions established by UNIVERSITY and under the control of UNIVERSITY.
- 3. UNIVERSITY will provide budgetary support to AIME in the form of office supplies, printing, and postage equal to five hundred dollars (\$500.00), which support is to assist the Executive Secretary in the performance of his duties.
- 4. UNIVERSITY will provide free local telephone service to AIME and will provide AIME access to the SUVON telephone system for appropriate long distance telephone service.
- 5. UNIVERSITY will release RECK from certain instructional duties at UNIVERSITY so that he may render service to AIME as its Executive Secretary. RECK will retain his status as an employee of UNIVERSITY, subject to the employment policies and practices of UNIVERSITY.
- 6. AIME will retain RECK as its Executive Secretary and will grant him the status of a nonvoting member of its Board of

Directors. RECK agrees to assume duties as Executive Secretary consistent with past practice and the expectations of a professional in the field.

- 7. RECK is expected to attend all meetings of the AIME Board of Directors and Executive Committee meetings upon invitation.
- 8. AIME will reimburse to RECK all usual and customary travel expenses incurred by RECK in attending meetings of the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee.
- 9. AIME will pay or reimburse all other travel expenses for RECK, not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200.00), to professional meetings upon prior approval of the AIME Board of Directors.
- 10. AIME will pay all other expenses attributable to its operation not set forth above, which expenses will be paid from its account #112.
- 11. AIME and UNIVERSITY are separate, independent entities, each subject to the direction of its own governing board, each assuming responsibility for its own acts or omissions, but assuming no responsibility for the acts or omissions of the other.
- 12. AIME, UNIVERSITY, and RECK agree to be bound by this agreement for its term of July 1, 1991 to and including June 30, 1992.
