The Indiana AHEC Scholars program is a part of a national initiative to prepare tomorrow's health professionals to become leaders in interprofessional, transformative practice who serve those who need it the most.

The competitive program is designed specifically for individuals who possess a strong drive to provide care to those living in rural and medically underserved communities across Indiana.

Over the two-year period, AHEC Scholars complete didactic and experiential training opportunities with a focus on rural and urban health care and caring for underserved populations with emphasis on the integration of five core issues – behavioral health integration, cultural competency, interprofessional education, practice transformation, and social determinants of health into practice.

"ISU offered the virtual instruction certificate program for the first time this summer and fall, with the first cohort of teachers just now completing the program. The university plans to offer it again next summer and fall, said Ryan Donlan, chair of the Department of Teaching and Learning at ISU's Bayh College of Education.

"The 12-credit program is for licensed teachers who want to improve their teaching skills using virtual instruction, a timely program given the COVID-19 pandemic and widespread use of virtual and hybrid learning. 'We felt there was a need,' Donlan said.

"The four courses are Virtual Learning Environments; Production of Instructional Materials; Multimedia Design for Interactive Learning; and Instructional Innovation. The current co-hort of 12 students, who are teachers, took two courses in the summer and two this fall." [MORE](#)
