## INDIANA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

### Information about the College

Indiana State Teachers College in Terre Haute, Indiana, is one of four state-supported colleges and universities in the State of Indiana, the others being Ball State Teachers College, Indiana University, and Purdue University. Indiana State was created on December 20, 1865, when an Act of the General Assembly provided for the founding of a teacher training institution. The doors of the college were first opened to students on January 6, 1870. In its ensuing 85-year history, the college has established itself as one of the finest teacher training colleges in the nation. The physical plant has grown to an evaluation exceeding eleven million dollars, and the enrollment has increased from the original 23 students to an average yearly student enrollment of over 3,400 different students.

The chief function of the college is to prepare students for positions as teachers, administrators, and other employees in the public schools. To this end, four major courses of study in this field are offered: one for elementary teachers, one for secondary school teachers, one for administrators, and other special school employees, and one for nurses.

While the major emphasis is on public school teaching and administration, Indiana State does, however, offer a wide variety of courses of study in other-than-teaching fields to meet the needs of the students. Those not preparing for the teaching profession may pursue regular four-year courses of study in art, secretarial science, accounting-business administration, merchandising-business administration, general business administration, journalism, medical technology, professional music, radio, social welfare, or theatre. The regular four-year liberal arts degree may be earned at the college. Four-year pre-professional courses are offered in pre-law and pre-medicine, and nursing is offered in cooperation with the local hospital schools of nursing. In addition, two-year pre-professional courses are offered in pre-dental and pre-engineering, and a two-year (non-degree) short course in business is offered to prepare students in either accounting or secretarial skill.

Indiana State occupies a quadrangular-shaped campus of some 40 acres in the heart of the City of Terre Haute in southwestern Indiana. The college's Allendale Lodge is maintained in the city's southern suburban area. The new physical education field, one-half sodded and the other half taken over by six tennis courts, is just one block west of the campus and was opened June, 1956. Lighting since has been added to the courts.

Thirteen buildings are situated on the compact campus area. All the buildings are relatively new and modern structures. The Home Economics Building was completed and opened for the first time the fall of 1956. An addition to the Industrial Education Building was also completed that summer. This addition houses the college printing and auto mechanics shops. Remodeling of the entire Industrial Education Building also has been completed. A \$600,000 addition to the College Library was completed during the past college year. The 25-classroom Education-Social Science Building was first opened in January, 1954. Three years ago, 91 rooms were added to Parsons Hall for men, and in 1955 a 76-room addition was completed to the Women's Residence Hall.



The twin Administration-Health Center Building and Language-Mathematics Building was completed at a cost of almost two million dollars and was opened in 1950.

Indiana State football, basketball, golf, baseball, tennis, track, and swimming teams maintain schedules and participate in intercollegiate competition. Freshmen are not eligible for varsity competition, Frosh schedules will be maintained, so far as they are permitted.

Indiana State and five other colleges and universities officially organized the Indiana Collegiate Conference in 1950. DePauw University was accepted as a seventh loop member in 1953, and the ICC has been operated as a seven-team league since 1954. Full schedules are slated for conference members in all sports throughout the 1957-58 college year. Current members of the conference are: Ball State, Indiana State, Valparaiso, Butler, St. Joseph's, DePauw, and Evansville.

## COACHING STAFF SKETCHES

DUANE M. KLUEH ---Head Basketball Coach (Indiana State, '49)

One of Indiana State's all-time greats, Duane Klueh, returned to his alma mater in the 1955-56 season, just six years after graduation, to take over the head hardwood coaching reins from John L. Longfellow, who retired to be athletic director here. Already, Klueh is recognized to be one of the better college coaches---being sound in practice and stern in his ways, he has developed a keen spirit for the Sycamores.

Klueh came to Indiana State after four successful years at Fowler High School and two years in professional net play. Following his college days at Terre Haute, in 1946-49, Klueh joined the net ranks as a pro for the Denver Nuggetts. Midway in the season (49-50), he became a member of the Fort Wayne Pistons. He stayed with them for the remainder of the season and all of the 1950-51 season.

At Fowler, his teams won 66 games and lost 30. His 1951-52 teams had a 10-13 mark, his 1952-53 unit sported a winning record of 15-9; while his 1953-54 quintet had a 20-4 record; His last record for the season at FHS was 21-4.

As an Indiana State net player, Klueh set three scoring marks that still stand; season scoring total of 597 points(1947-48); 17.6 point game average (34 games) in 1947-48 also; and a three-year total of 1432 points. He was a first-string forward for three seasons, 1946-49.

Indiana State was represented by him on the Helms All-American team in 1948, when Klueh became the only Sycamore to be named to the first ten. The same season, he was a standout in the NAIA tourney in Kansas City and was named to the first-all-tourney team and was named most valuable player.

He earned his B.S. and M.S. degrees at Indiana State. He is married to the former Miss Mary Alice Shannon, Terre Haute, and they have four children.



ROBERT HOLLAR --- Head Freshman Basketball Coach (Manchester, '41)

Serving his third season as head frosh coach will be Robert L. Hollar, who also is head freshman coach in baseball and football. His job in the past two seasons has been an important one in that no freshman have been eligible for varsity participation because of a 1956 Indiana College Conference ruling.

Hollar's job now is to select those players from frosh teams who he feels will be varsity material. He gains some help from varsity coaches here but the bulk of the practice and game chores falls on his shoulders. His work has been hailed by varsity coaches the past year. This year's freshman team will play a seven-game schedule as allowed by the ICC, meeting Butler, DePauw and Evansville in home-and-home contests and playing a single game with St. Joseph's at Indiana State.

A member of the Indiana State faculty since 1950, Hollar was Dean of the Indiana State College Laboratory School prior to his appointment on the athletic staff in 1955. He assisted in coaching of all sports at the Lab School (State High School).

A Manchester college graduate, he served as coach in several Indiana High Schools and at Hanover before coming to Indiana State. He was coach at Van Buren in 1941-42; Hanover College instructor and coach in 1947; and New Paris coach from 1948 to 50.

## 1957-58 BASKETBALL PROSPECTS AT INDIANA STATE

"We are in the best shape we have been in since I came here two years ago, and we should make a good showing this season," says Coach Duane Klueh in commenting upon this season's edition of the Indiana State hardwood team.

The Sycamores have four of five starters back from last year, plus four other men who saw regular action in varsity competition. Also, a sterling group of sophomores up from last year's 3-3 freshman team is working for starting berths.

"We might be a little lacking in the height department this season, but if the men rebound like I think they can, it should help immensely, because our shooting will be among the best. Also, our defense, of which rebounding is a part, will have to develop as the season moves along," says Klueh.

The slender, former Helms All-American from Indiana State, has not been able to single out one five which will really be the starting unit as yet, but he has a good idea, since four of the men did start much of the time in the 1956-57 season which saw the Sycamores post a 12-13 record.

Sam Richardson was the only man graduated from that unit and his place in the center spot will either be taken by Jim Gangloff or Don Noblitt at the beginning, with Jim Waugh making a possible move later in the year. Gangloff and Waugh both are lettermen, while Noblitt is a sophomore.

Back at guards this season are Ted Dayhuff and Ted Wesolek, two "Tough Teddies" back where they left off at the end of last year. However, two hustling sophomores are pushing these lettermen hard for starting berths. They are: Roy Kaserman and Ron Meriwether. Both were members of last season's frosh team and started most every game.

Jim Bates, leading scorer, and Bob Clark, leading percentage shooter, both are back at forwards and now hold down the starting (more)

berths with Jim Dodd, sophomore from Winchester, pushing them hard.

This is the way the outlook seemed before the varsity tangled with the freshman team in the unofficial season lid-lifter, Nov. 26. It may remain this way, but there are several other men who undoubtedly will make their move as the season progresses.

Bob Cripe and John Luse, letterwinners at center and forwards, respectively, are working hard in practice and both should see their share of action. Also, Jim Duffy and Mel Bair, at forwards, will be a threat with the shooting eyes that they possess, and Ron Heyen and Mike Jones will be contenders for the guard positions.

All in all, it could be a good season for Indiana State with the experience and depth that the outfit possesses. The Sycamores will really start out the rough way this season, as they battle with Cincinnati University in the first game, Dec. 6. The Bearcats are pre-rated at 13th and 8th in two different polls. And, they have Oscar Robertson, former flash for Indianapolis Attucks! No team will have an easy time with Cincy this year with Oscar and four of last year's starters left from the varsity to go with him! If the Sycamores can make a good showing in Cincy against the Cats, it will be a stabilizing move the whole season.

RON HEYEN --- Junior from Indianapolis has been here for first time at Indiana State... played on county championship teams his junior and senior years at nearby county school and should be good contender for a guard slot this year under Klueh...won basketball and track letters in high school and is majoring in physical education and business here at Indiana State.

MIKE JONES --- Junior back at guard...from Pine Village, where he was a constant leading pointmaker...married...won four baseball and basketball letters in high school under coach Forrest Martin...is majoring in physical education and biological science here... a real hustler...may go places.
