Information About:

INDIANA STATE COLLEGE

Indiana State College located in Terre Haute, Indiana, is one of four state-supported colleges and universities in the state of Indiana. The others are Ball State Teachers College, Indiana University, and Purdue University. Indiana State was created on December 20, 1865, when an act of the General Assembly provided for the founding of a teacher training institution. The doors were first opened to twenty-three students on January 6, 1870. In the 91-year period of its existence, the College has become firmly established and recognized as one of the nation's finest teacher education colleges. The expansion of the nature of the college education offerings was recognized with the name change on July 7, 1961, to Indiana State.

The physical plant has grown to an evaluation exceeding 21 million dollars, and the enrollment increased from the original 23 students to an enrollment of over 5,000 on campus students and an additional 1,500 to 2,000 students enrolled in extension and correspondence study. Termed one of the "fastest-growing colleges in the Midwest", enrollment increased 140 per cent over seven-year period, 1953-60.

Primary emphasis in the College's instructional program is to prepare students for professional careers as teachers, school administrators, and other public school positions. To this end, courses of study are offered for elementary teachers, secondary teachers, school administrators, and other special school employees, and nurses.

While primary emphasis is on preparation of students for the teaching profession, Indiana State does offer strong and highly-rated programs of study preparing students for other professional careers. The regular four-year liberal arts degree program is offered. Also offered are four-year degree programs in art, secretarial science, accounting-business administration, merchandising-business administration, general business administration, public accounting, medical technology, professional music, radio-television, pre-social work, or theatre. Four-year pre-professional degree courses are offered in pre-law and pre-medicine, and two-year (non-degree) courses are offered in pre-dentistry and pre-engineering. A two-year (non-degree) short course in business is offered to prepare students for positions in either accounting or secretarial work.

Indiana State occupies an expanding campus area of more than 45 acres in the heart of the city of Terre Haute which is located in southwestern Indiana along the famous "Banks of the Wabash". The College's Allendale Lodge is maintained in the city's southern suburban Allendale District. The Physical Education Field, one-half sodded and the other half taken over by six lighted grasstex tennis courts is just one block west of the campus quadrangle. More physical education areas are now being completed. The construction of a new Men's Physical Education Building started in late summer of 1960 and will be dedicated in early 1962. Home football and baseball games are now played in Terre Haute's Memorial Stadium.

An Athletic Field in the locale of the new Men's P. E. Building is contemplated. This field would have facilities for football, track, and baseball events. Terre Haute is also the home of two other outstanding colleges, Rose Polytechnic Institute (an engineering college for men) and St. Mary-of-the-Woods College (a Catholic girls' college).

Nineteen campus buildings are located on the compact downtown Indiana State campus area. A new Home Economics Building and a new addition to the Industrial Education Building housing printing and auto mechanics shops were opened in 1956. The entire three-story Industrial Education Building was completely remodeled and newly-equipped and opened in the fall of 1957. The College Library was remodeled and a new six-story air-conditioned addition was completed to the building in 1957. The 25-classroom Education-Social Studies Building was first opened in January, 1954. Five years ago, 91 rooms were added to Parsons Hall for men, and four years ago, a 76-room addition was completed to the Women's Residence Hall. The twin Administration-Health Center and Language-Mathematics Building were completed at a cost of almost two million dollars in 1950.

A new six-story women's residence hall and an addition to the Student Union Building were both completed in 1959. A new six-story women's hall and a new nine-story men's hall are now under construction and will be ready in Sept., 1962. Two more such halls will probably be put under construction in the 1961-62 year. A new Bookstore Building will be ready in November, 1961, and the old Science Building will be remodeled as the new Business Department home during the 1961-62 year. A new \$2,500,000 Science Building was dedicated in April, 1961.

Indiana State football, basketball, baseball, golf, tennis, track, cross country, wrestling, and swimming teams participate and maintain schedules in intercollegiate competition. Freshmen are not eligible to compete on varsity teams, but frosh schedules are maintained in most all sports. Wrestling and gymnastic coaches were added to the coaching staff in 1959.

Indiana State and five other Indiana colleges and universities officially organized the Indiana Collegiate Conference in 1950. DePauw University was accepted as a seventh loop member in 1953, and the ICC has been operating as a seven-team conference since 1954. Full schedules in all sports were slated for all conference members for the first time in the 1959-60 year.

SYCAMORE OUTLOOK

Indiana State basketball hopes are high for the coming season, but a lack of height in the starting lineup will be the biggest problem with coach Duane Klueh's running Sycamores.

Five of the first six players will be returning from the 1960-61 team that compiled a 17-9 season record. The Sycamores finished second in the Indiana Collegiate Conference with a 9-3 record.

Klueh's first five will not average six foot tall and will depend greatly on speed and accuracy. Two seniors returning are center Howard Dardeen, 6-4 from Terre Haute Gerstmeyer, and forward Ray Goddard, 6-0 from Terre Haute Gerstmeyer.

The Sycamores crafty little guards, John Robbins, 5-8 junior from Thorntown, and John Dow, 5-9 from East Chicago Washington, are both returning.

The only starter who graduated was forward Warren Ross and his position will probably be filled by Steve Newton, 6-1 from Terre Haute Gerstmeyer. Newton was the sixth man on the squad last year.

Two tall sophomores, who are capable replacements, will be on the bench for rebounding chores and to rest the first five. The two are 6-5 Wendell Huffstutler from Prairie Creek, and 6-5 Wayne Allison from Hutsonville, Ill. Also adding depth to the squad as sophomores will be 6-5 Darryl Williams from East Chicago Washington, and 6-7 Al Belskus from Terre Haute Wiley.

The Sycamores will open their season by hosting Concordia of St. Louis Dec. 1. The next night, Saturday Dec. 2, Indiana State will travel to Cincinnati to meet NCAA champion University of Cincinnati.
