Winter Quarter begins December 10, 1934, and ends March 14, 1935

Spring Quarter begins March 20, 1935, and ends June 11, 1935

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MID-SPRING AND SUMMER TERMS

Short Terms—In addition to the three regular quarters of twelve weeks each, three short terms are offered at Indiana State Teachers College in the Mid-Spring Term, the First Summer Term, and the Second Summer Term. The Mid-Spring Term, which opens with the seventh week of the regular Spring Quarter and runs concurrently with it for the next six weeks, is largely for those teachers in the short term schools of the state who wish to do an added term of work in college during the spring and summer months. The summer terms each extend for five weeks with the work so arranged that attendance at these two terms is equivalent to one regular quarter of work.

Registration—Registration will be held for all students on the opening day of each term. The Mid-Spring Term will open on Monday, May 7, 1934, and close on Friday, June 15, 1934. The First Summer Term will open Monday, June 18, 1934, and close on Friday, July 20, 1934. The Second Summer Term will open on Monday, July 23, 1934, and close on Friday, August 24, 1934.

Credit—Students enrolled in any of these three short terms will take two prepared subjects only, but they will give double time to these two subjects. The prepared recitation and lecture periods will extend for two hours while the length of the laboratory periods will also be doubled. In this manner, students may earn a full four-hour credit in each of the subjects taken and avoid the inconvenience of fractional or incomplete credits. Classes during the Summer Terms will meet regularly five days each week. In the First Summer Term classes will meet on Saturday, June 23, to make up for the Fourth of July holiday. Classes during

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the Mid-Spring Term, which extends for six weeks, will observe the regular schedule of float periods.

Tuition and Fees—Free tuition is given to all resident students of Indiana. Non-residents of Indiana will pay six dollars (\$6.00) per term as non-resident tuition.

All students, resident and non-resident of Indiana, will pay a contingent fee of twelve dollars and fifty cents (\$12.50) per term. A penalty fee is charged for late entrance. All other regular penalty fees of the college, such as breakage fees, extra health fees, special examination fees, etc., are enforced.

Licenses—In the courses offered for these short terms provision is made for the following groups of teachers:

1. Teachers in the one-room rural schools.
2. Teachers in the primary grades.
3. Teachers in the intermediate and grammar grades.
4. Teachers in the junior high schools.
5. Teachers and supervisors in the grades in the special subjects of art, commerce, home economics, industrial arts, music, and physical education.
6. Principals of elementary schools.
7. Teachers in the high schools.
8. Teachers of special subjects in the high schools.
9. Principals and superintendents.

The legal requirements for the several licenses issued by the State of Indiana and the detailed description of the courses offered by the Indiana State Teachers College for satisfying these requirements may be found in the annual catalog of the college which will be sent to any teacher interested upon application to the Registrar.

Beginning Students—Classes are organized during the Mid-Spring and Summer Terms for beginning students on all courses.

Advanced Licenses—Work will be offered in each of these short terms which is required on the Master's degree in Education and for first grade administrative licenses. This graduate work is offered only in the field of Education.

All courses having the initial number "5" are of the graduate level.

Sequence of Courses—Attention of students who are planning their courses is again called to the fact that the work of the college has been so organized as to fall into two distinct groups, (1) The Junior College and (2) The Senior College. The Junior College comprises the courses of the freshman and sophomore years and the Senior College, the work of the junior and senior years. Students enrolled in the Junior College may not reach forward into the Senior College while Senior College students may not reach into the Junior College for more than ten per cent of the courses. In other words, freshman and sophomore students should take the "100" and "200" courses while students of junior or senior standing should make their selections from the "300" or "400" group.

Hours of Recitation—Recitation and lecture periods are two hours in length, according to the following schedule:

Activities—Convocation periods will be held from time to time during the Summer Terms at the call of the President or the Dean of Instruction. During the Mid-Spring Term, convocations will be held at the regular hour each Wednesday.

Special programs will be offered on the Activities Course during each of the short terms. These programs are not entirely complete at the present time but will include some outstanding lecturers and entertainers.

Director of Student Programs—Students who are nearing graduation should confer with the Director of Student Programs before registering to make sure that they are taking the courses required to complete the curriculum upon which they have been working. The Director of Stu-

dent Programs will be glad to confer with any student relative to the selection of his courses.

Advanced Standing—Students entering Indiana State Teachers College with advanced standing will receive credit for all scholarship which such students may possess. Applicants for such advanced standing must present to the Director of Student Programs an official statement covering the following points:

1. The exact length of time spent in the school with the dates of entering and leaving.
2. The number of subjects studied each term.
3. The exact subjects studied.
4. The number of weeks spent on each subject.
5. The length of the recitation period.
6. The number of recitation periods per week.
7. The record of the grade of work done in each subject.

The college will accept credit for advanced standing from those institutions only which have been accredited by the North Central Association and affiliated associations or by the American Association of Teachers Colleges. Students from institutions not so accredited will be required by the Committee on Entrance, Credit, and Graduation to make such additional credit as may be necessary to meet the requirements.

Rules and Regulations—All rules and regulations of the college pertaining to the regular quarter are applicable to the short terms. Thus, all students who do not return to their homes each evening should confer with the respective deans before securing rooming places in the city. Inquiries relative to rooms for girls should be addressed to Mrs. Charlotte S. Burford, dean of women, while similar inquiries from men students should be sent to Prof. Frederick H. Weng, dean of men.
